From the Pastor's Desk

III: PRESENTING THE LORD! Advent Reflection Series on The Five Joyful Mysteries of the Most Holy Rosary

My dear parish family:

On this Third Sunday of Advent – Gaudete Sunday – the Sunday of Joy, when we put the purple away for a bit and the bright rose colored vestments and altar cloths adorn our Advent journey, let us turn to the next joyful mystery. We are out of order, because the third mystery is the Birth of Jesus, but we will wait till Christmas for that one – and in the meantime look at the Presentation of the Lord.



We read from Sacred Scripture: Luke 2:22, 34, 35 – "When the days of her purification were fulfilled they took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord...Simeon blessed them and said to his Mother, 'Behold, this child is destined for the fall and for the rise of many in Israel, and for a sign that shall be contradicted; and thy own soul a sword shall pierce."

Let us reflect now: There had never been a presentation like the one that took place in the Temple that day and there never would be again. Mary and Joseph were presenting the Only

Begotten Son to the Eternal Father – the Word Made Flesh Who was now Dwelling with Us! It was monumental when we were brought to churches by our parents for our "presentation" or baptism, but here we have the ultimate presentation to the world of the continuation of God's saving plan for us and every human person ever! The Holy Family were also acknowledging that this child was not their own, and that his first bond of intimate family relationship was to His Father – Our Father in Heaven. Mary loved her child with wonderful and irreplaceable love, as all mothers do, yet even she, the selfless and obedient one who had said yes to the angel, was promised at the Presentation that a "sword of sorrow would pierce her heart on the day of separation." We know she stood by her son through the pain of the Cross into the inexhaustible joy of the Resurrection. Let us contemplate then: why does God give us such beautiful gifts and then ask us to give them up? Why does he allow a loving heart to be pierced with loss? These questions must be brought to Mary, who more than any mother, any father, endured loss, but never gave up her faith and trust in God's plan. So too must we! Through this joyful mystery, she can help our hearts accept what our mind cannot understand. Joy will always conquer sorrow. The light of Jesus will always dispel the darkness. Soon, at Christmas, the world we see Him again in a new way!

Each week I will end my meditation with the words of Saint John XXIII. They come from a retreat he offered on the joyful mysteries around 1961: While still in his mother's arms, the life of Jesus unfolds to the meeting of the two Testaments. He is light and revelation to the nations, the splendor of the chosen people. St. Joseph must be present and also participate in the rite of offering prescribed by the Law. This episode is perpetuated in the Church. As we recite, the Hail Mary's of this decade, it is beautiful to observe the joyful hopes of the perennial re-flowering of the promise of priests, religious, deacons, and dedicated lay people who cooperate in great numbers in the kingdom of God. Here also are the young students of the seminaries, of religious houses, of Catholic schools as well as other youth of a future lay apostolate whose growth in numbers-in spite of difficulties and setbacks and harassed even by persecutions in many nations-never ceases to be a comforting sight, which evokes words of admiration and joy.

This Advent may we wait in joyful hope for the coming of Jesus!

#### Synod: Key Term #3

#### The infallible belief of the Faithful: What is the sensus fidei fidelium?

One of the reasons that Pope Francis has been emphasizing synodality is that he wishes to better recognize and utilize all the gifts of all the people in the Church. Most of us know that the Magisterium of the Church (the teaching office of the Church exercised by the Pope and the bishops), under certain conditions, can teach infallibily. But the faithful members of Christ's Church also have a corresponding gift. We can believe infallibly. Ideally these two gifts should inform and reinforce each other.

This gift of the Holy Spirit is called the *sensus fidei fidelium*: The understanding of the Faith by the Faithful. Everyone who is baptized is anointed with the Holy Spirit, and this anointing is strengthened by the Sacrament of Confirmation. By the grace of the Spirit, the People of God as a whole does not err in faith, even when it cannot adequately explain the faith. The more faithful a Christian is - participating in the Sacraments, building their relationship with God, feeling with the heart of the Church - the better of an instinct they will have for the True Faith. When we are open to Him, God gives us an intuition about divine realities. And when the entire People of God manifests a belief of faith or morals, that belief cannot be wrong, because the Holy Spirit would not allow the entire Church to go into error.

The sensus fidei cannot be determined by majority vote. History shows that individuals and groups in the Church, whether members of the faithful or bishops, can very easily fall into error and sin. The more separated a person is from God and His Church, the less likely they will be to instinctively recognize the truths of the Faith - and we have all sinned and fallen short (Romans 3:23). However, if the faithful stubbornly cling to some belief or obstinately refuse to accept another, for a long time and in many places, even in the face of opposition and persecution, that should be a sign to the Magisterium of the *sensus fidei* at work.

#### What is the Synod on Synodality?

Pope Francis has asked the entire world to participate in a synod on the topic "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission." The central question asks of everyone is:

A synodal Church, in announcing the Gospel, "journeys together." How is this "journeying together" happening today in our diocese? What steps does the Spirit invite us to take in order to grow in our "journeying together"?

You may be invited to participate in listening sessions at your local parish, or you may wish to give your input online. Participation in a synod should always involve prayer, listening, discussion, and above all, discerning the way that the Holy Spirit is guiding us. Hopefully these questions and answers can help you as you prepare your input.



he Church celebrates the third Sunday of Advent today. It is known as Gaudete Sunday because the opening words of the Mass coming from Scripture, "Rejoice", coming from the Latin *Gaudete* — rejoice — is the entrance antiphon for today and the controlling idea of the first reading from Zephaniah.




n Gaudete Sunday the priest may wear either violet or rose vestments and we light the rose candle on the

wreath. This custom of rose vestments is a 10th century practice (one that we also observe on the Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday). In the season of Advent, the color rose is a sign of anticipatory Christmas joy as it also marks the midpoint of Advent.

## St. Lucy |Feast Day December 13

A name that means "light," St. Lucy (283 – 304) is the patron saint of those blind or suffering with eye trouble. Not much is known about her life, except that she was determined to remain a virgin and thus refused marriage. History tells the story of a frustrated suitor who eventually accused St. Lucy of being a Christian (at crime at the time), and she was executed in Syracuse, Sicily, in the year 304.

Today, we celebrate a number of traditions that incorporate symbolic meaning of St. Lucy as the "bearer" of light in the darkness of winter. This is particularly seen in Scandinavian countries, with their long dark winters. There, a young girl dressed in a white dress and a red sash (as the symbol of martyrdom) carries palms and wears a crown or wreath of candles on her head. In Denmark, Norway and Sweden, girls dressed as Lucy carry rolls and cookies in procession as songs are sung.

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
