

From the Pastor's Desk

My dear parish family:

My pastor growing up in Coalport, Father Alex Amico, once told me of how his mother's parents passed away. Both of his grandparents left this mortal world in very religious and unique ways. His grandfather, Andrew, died as he ascended the front steps of Saint Anne Church in Farrell. Death is always sad, but what a wonderful place to pass into eternity than walking up the steps into mass. He was going to share the Bread of Life at mass and ended up, we hope, with the true Bread of Life, Jesus, in heaven. My pastor's grandmother, Julia, died in the home of her daughter near Hubbard, Ohio. It was her practice to say the rosary every day by kneeling in a chair in the living room. Basically she faced the back rest of the chair praying the rosary. That day her family found her in that kneeling position, the rosary in her clasped hand, asleep in the Lord. Again what a wonderful and beautiful way to meet God face to face than by praying the Holy Rosary.

I have to admit growing up I didn't pray the rosary often. I did at church on occasion. Many times I prayed the holy beads with my grandma at her parish before mass. But as a daily moment of conversation with God by myself, the rosary eluded me. I am so distracted by the numbering: Am I on Hail Mary seven or eight? What are the Luminous Mysteries again? I am sure many of you pray the rosary daily - maybe even more. I am sure many of you prayed it with your family, hopefully you still do. In this month of October dedicated to the Blessed Mother, but in all months throughout the year, it would benefit all of us to remain with or return to this time-honored and beautiful form of prayer.

I have realized that its OK to get lost or distracted in prayer. Maybe some soul-searching or mediation is what I need, not just an obligation to get the prayer done. It is the same with so many spiritual moments - a word in the first reading that you just want to stay with and unpack - a prayer you've known since childhood that at that moment needs to be on a repetitive loop for your soul to heal - an antiquated practice that is still very much available and needed in our current days. The prayer to Saint Michael that we now pray together at the end of every mass is a perfect example. The rosary is just one of many moments of prayer that we all need to make use.

Prayer is not just a solitary - by myself - activity. It can be, and there are particular times we need that alone time, but prayer can also be so much more fruitful and encouraging when done together, especially at mass. But even more importantly prayer is powerful when done as a family. Father Patrick Peyton was correct when he so famously said many decades ago: "THE FAMILY THAT PRAYS TOGETHER STAYS TOGETHER!" Those words - that ideal - that practice will never go out of date. It would benefit us all to resurrect or reinforce it today.

I don't know that I'll ever be able to pray the rosary as beautifully as my pastor's grandmother or my own sainted grandmothers. Maybe one day I'll be holy enough that I won't spend the whole time distracted. Or maybe even at my holiest it still won't fit my personality. No matter. I'll pray it either way, not because of what it does for me but because of what it does to me, even when I don't notice it. I hope and pray the same happens for you!

When my grandfather was dying, the priest came and anointed him, and then said he would give him viaticum. What is that?

A

All during our life, we receive Communion at Mass. Most are the regular Sunday celebrations. Others might have special meaning and purpose: weddings, confirmation, retreats, and funerals. Although it is the same Lord we receive each time, the reason we receive the Eucharist changes and adds special meaning to the sacrament. Whether we are praying for someone, asking for grace, or joining together as a community of faith, the Eucharist sustains us and allows us to join our prayers and sacrifice to the Lord's.

As the hour of our death approaches, the reception of Communion takes on a special purpose. We receive the Lord to accompany us on our journey from this life to the next. Viaticum comes from a Latin word meaning "provision for the journey." It refers to the rite of giving Communion to a person near death. People often think of "last rites" as anointing of the sick, but there are several sacramental rites that we can receive at the end of our life, including penance and Eucharist. The Eucharist is the completion of the Christian's life on earth and the beginning of eternal life.


