

## SAINT OF THE WEEK – ST. PETER OF ALCANTARA | FEAST DAY OCTOBER 26

St. Peter of Alcantara was born in Alcantara, Spain in 1499. His father was the Governor of the province and his mother came from a noble family. He was privately tutored and attended the University of Salamanca. After he returned home from university, he was accepted as a Franciscan Friar of the Stricter Observance in 1515. He was ordained as a priest in 1524 and in 1525 he became Guardian of the friary of St. Mary of the Angels.

Throughout his life, St. Peter of Alcantara took up his spiritual cross and preached with great success to the poor, but also spend much of his time in solitude. From 1553 to early 1555, he spent this time alone in meditation and prayer. Soon following, St. Peter made a pilgrimage to Rome, barefoot the entire way. While in Rome he obtained permission from Pope Julius III to establish friaries.

St. Peter was known for frequently experiencing ecstasy, a state where he was entirely consumed with the warmth and light of the Holy Spirit. These euphoric moments were common during his prayer and meditation.

When he was near death, St. Peter took to his knees and prayed. When he was offered water, he refused it, saying, "Even my Lord Jesus Christ thirsted on the Cross." He died while in prayer on October 18, 1562. On April 18, 1622, he was declared blessed by Pope Gregory XV and later canonized by Pope Clement IX on April 28, 1669.

# From the Pastor's Desk

## HOW LATE HAVE I LOVED YOU

The Greatest Commandment – Epilogue to our Ten Commandments Reflection Series

My dear parish family:

We read from the Gospel according to Saint Matthew: "When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a scholar of the law, tested him by asking, 'Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?' He said to him, 'You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment.'"

Over the past ten weeks, or so, we have journeyed through the ten ways that God invites us to love Him, others and ourselves in a more intimate and beautiful way. Thousands of years ago when He Himself carved those ways to love into the stone in front of Moses atop Mount Sinai, humanity's mission to love began in a new way. That journey – that mission – that way of living out our relationship with our God continues for us today. As a way of cap stoning our reflections, I offer you as a final meditation, as Scripture records, the greatest commandment!.



Throughout our reflections on the Ten Commandments, I have urged you to replace "thou shall not" with "I will love more." Now we come to Jesus' combining of all we have reflected within that same view – love. Sometimes we forget to love. Sometimes we don't love enough. For some of us love is frightening or embarrassing to express. For others we need just a small drop of it to survive. Whatever the case may be, the bottom line is that is NEVER TOO LATE TO LOVE! Especially to love the God who gives us everything and takes nothing but sin and pain and emptiness away.

Every August 28<sup>th</sup>, the Church throughout the world honors (unless the date falls on a Sunday, of course) one of our greatest and most human saints – Augustine. He wasn't perfect; in fact his worldliness and sinful indulgences during his youth pale in comparison to some of the "stuff" kids do today. If it was sinful and immoral, Augustine did it! Yet his mother Saint Monica, never gave up hope for his conversion (to change his life and embrace God's love) and she prayed for decades. She prayed that it was never too late for her son. Augustine did change and God rejoiced. In one of his most famous works *The Confessions*, Augustine puts his love for God in these beautiful terms, he prays: "How late have I loved you, O Beauty ever ancient, ever new, how late have I loved you! You were within me, but I was outside, and it was there that I searched for you. In my unloveliness I plunged into the lovely things which you created. You were with me, but I was not with you. Created things kept me from you; yet if they had not been in you they would not have been at all. You called, you shouted, and you broke through my deafness. You flashed, you shone, and you dispelled my blindness. You breathed your fragrance on me; I drew in breath and now I pant for you. I have tasted you, now I hunger and thirst for more. You touched me, and I burned for your peace."

How often does God shout to us for love? How often does He call to our hearts to be open and receptive to His love? How often does He search for us to close to Him? The answer: every time our heart beats in every moment of every day! That's how much He loves us and don't you think that is what we must return to Him? Again, the answer is a resounding yes! Augustine shows us that God never gives up on us even though we often do. Augustine's holy life proves that it's never too late!

Nothing is more practical than finding God, than falling in Love in a quite absolute, final way. What you are in love with, what seizes your imagination, will affect everything. It will decide what will get you out of bed in the morning, what you do with your evenings, how you spend your weekends, what you read, whom you know, what breaks your heart, and what amazes you with joy and gratitude. Fall in Love, stay in love, and it will decide everything. So the question this week for all of us, my dear friends, is: How will I fall in love in God all over again today? And when you come up with an answer, share it; yes, share it with our Creator, share it with family and friends, share with someone you don't even know. Just don't say "I love you God." Live it!

I was once asked one of my students in Punxsutawney – her name was Donna Jean – what word best described how much God love us. Her response was seared onto my heart: "there isn't a word big enough!" Well said, Donna Jean, yes, well loved! It's true, there isn't a word big enough, but for now, here on earth, we can strive every day to come close. It's not too late, together let's start now!

As Fulton Sheen used to say, "God love you!" and may your week be blessed!

#### Giving as God does

Ask yourself this question — what would you pray for if you really believed God could and would do anything for you? In my experience, we all have something. We all have that miracle we're afraid to request, afraid we will be disappointed.

Do we doubt God's readiness to give because we ourselves have such an imperfect understanding of charity and love? Maybe if we had better faith in God we would be more ready to give of ourselves — and maybe if we were more ready to give of ourselves, we would understand more clearly the ways of God.

Because we're not really afraid that God can't do something. We know He can do anything. What we're afraid of is that He will do what He always does: give us what we need, not what we want.

Have you ever had a friend in need and you just wanted to give them something — a meal, a phone call, a text? Not because you knew it would help, but simply because you wanted to reach out. And have they ever said to you: It wasn't so much what you gave, but the fact that you did. You gave them what they needed even if it wasn't what they specifically asked for.

When we give in this manner, we are giving as God does. Sometimes we are afraid to ask because we don't want to be disappointed. But remember, the blind man on the road got what he asked for, but he would have gotten what he needed even if his answer had been the opposite. God's generosity is always reckless, and it's always perfect.
