From the Pastor's Desk

My dear parish family:

There was an oath of allegiance – a promise of faith – a contract of intent that every soldier – every general who took up arms to win our freedom from Great Britain in the American Revolution took, including one general who besides George Washington is that one general from that war that all of us know his name even after more than 200 years – Benedict Arnold. He signed that oath of allegiance in 1787 but just 18 months later he would go down in history by another name – traitor. He would be added to that same list that included Marcus Brutus, who conspired to kill Julius Caesar and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed the Son of God for thirty pieces of silver. In fact on this oath the person promising his allegiance had to write in their own hand the word "swear." It was that important to write out that single word of promise – fidelity – that I am going to fight for my country.

What happened to Benedict Arnold – to Brutus – to Judas – to those countless (now nameless) people throughout history who acted in the same way? They've been branded as traitors, but I think it goes beyond treason. The answer lies under the surface of their selfishness. General Arnold must not have listened to the 40<sup>th</sup> psalm - the same words we just prayed: "Here I am Lord, I come to do your will."

Who's will? How often we gloss over that very important fact; how often society and the world replace that essential truth – that it's not the world's will, or society's will, or our friend's will, or our own personal will, but **God's will** – God's promises – God's plan – His plan always rooted in love for every human person.

For Brutus – Judas – Arnold, that was their mistake – that was their sin, not so much treason and betrayal, both of which are not good and I suggest strongly that none of us ever dip our toes in either of those waters; but the root of their treason, the start of their betrayal was that they were drowning in their own will and ignored everything else. Brutus ignored the will of the Roman people and just wanted to be more powerful in the Senate killing Caesar would get him there. Benedict Arnold threw away the will of a nation that deserved freedom switching sides was his solution. And then there's Judas - once Jesus' friend - once a committed follower of the Messiah – but greed for a measly thirty scraps of silver polluted his soul to give away and erase God's will from his life - literally "kissing off" Jesus.

See the pattern – the thread? All of them chose the follow THEIR will – their misguided and wrong decisions. They shut themselves off from God's will - His voice - His direction - His love. I would imagine that all three of them realized their awful mistake soon after their betrayal, but the damage had already been done. Even in our language today their names are synonymous with abandoning those closest to them: "You Judas! Don't be a Benedict Arnold!" None of us want to be on the receiving end of those statements.



"Here I am Lord, here I am, I come to do your will." Here I am with all my flaws – all my scars – all the sins – all my humanness, yet here I am! For You God!! It's the perfect prayer we can begin every morning - to totally abandon ourselves to God - to surrender, not like the British in the Revolution, but surrender all we have, our soul, our gifts, our love to the will of God – to Him who first breathed life in us, who first loved us, who first taught us to live in His light. So shouldn't God be the first person we think of in the morning? Shouldn't God be the first person we want to talk to in the morning? Shouldn't God be first one we love? Then why is it

"me – me – me" "my – my – my" "I want – I need – I must?" Do we need to change our focus – our attitude – our direction? Yes! Can we change our will to be more like God's will? Is it possible to let God increase more and more every day? Again, the answer is Yes! Yes, we can do it. We can do it together. WHEN GOD CALLS -ANSWER, "YES!" - SAY, "HERE I AM, SEND ME!!"


#### PARISH LOAN

### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

### 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Our faith is not just about ideas. It's really about having an encounter with God and, in particular, the Risen Christ! Once we give ourselves over to the notion of God's presence, we have to train ourselves to listen for God's voice and be attentive to God's call. Having companions on our faith journeys is so incredibly important as they can help us fine-tune our listening skills and discern God's voice from others we may be hearing. Faith is all about having these profound encounters not only with God but with our brothers and sisters, and creation itself. Anyone or anything that is alive with God's presence becomes an occasion for God to speak and call us to deeper graces and experiences. "Come, and you will see."

The example and teaching of Jesus, the lives of the saints, those living among us and those glorified in heaven, and the wonder and beauty of creation can all serve to help us listen more clearly and assist in positioning ourselves for this profound God meeting. It is an encounter that can quickly and easily lead to a friendship and intimate intertwining of our souls to their Maker, making a claim on us like no other. Then, the Word of God moves from being just a body of ideas to something we simply accept and do. The person of Jesus Christ swiftly moves from being just a good prophet in word and deed to the incarnate presence of God Himself, the Lamb of God. The voice leads us to the Person behind it.

The Gospel is hard to follow. We can intellectually debate whether what Jesus said is really what we are asked to do. The Gospel ideas do not always make sense in our practical, secular world. The person of God always does. We can debate the practicality and sense of ideas and doing so often keeps the more difficult ones at a safe distance away from us. Jesus said to love our enemy, but we really don't need to do that, our minds try to convince us. It just doesn't make sense. Yet, if we are truly in love with the God who is behind the voice of those words, they make perfect sense. Our deep and intimate love of this God would even find us laying down our lives for Him if necessary. Speak Lord, your servant is listening. ©LPi


