## From the Pastor's Desk

#### REMEMBERING THE DEPARTED IN NOVEMBER: Prayers

My dear parish family:

Many of you will recall the large red book the priest used to read from before the words of the mass were retranslated in 2011. There were numerous invocations for the dead that were found in the Eucharistic Prayers in that book of the time. I liked the way they were translated then, so during this month of November as we honor our beloved dead let us from time to time recite one or all of these prayers, so that one day – we hope and pray – we will join our loved ones in the never-ending and joyous existence of heaven.

In the formerly translated <u>Eucharistic Prayer I</u> we prayed: "Remember, Lord, those who have died and have gone before us marked with the sign of faith, especially for those for whom we now pray. May these, and all who sleep in Christ, find in your presence light happiness and peace." The old <u>Second Eucharistic Prayer</u> put it this way: "Remember our brothers and sisters who gone to their rest in the hope of rising again; bring them and all the departed into the light of your presence." We honor the deceased thus in former <u>Eucharistic Prayer III</u>: "Welcome into your kingdom our departed brothers and sisters and all who have left this world in your friendship. We hope to enjoy for ever the vision of your glory, through Christ our Lord, from whom all good things come." From the old <u>Fourth Eucharistic Prayer</u> we heard very simply: "Remember those who have died in the peace of Christ and all the dead whose faith is known to you alone."

In the back of the Sacramentary there was more emotionally charged language in regards to the dead and our relationship with them in the two <u>Eucharistic Prayers for Masses of Reconciliation</u>: "Help us to work together for the coming of your kingdom, until at last we stand in your presence to share the life of the saints, in the company of the Virgin Mary and the apostles and of our departed brothers and sisters whom we commend to your mercy." "In that new world where the fullness of your peace will be revealed, gather people of every race, language, and way of life to share in the one eternal banquet."

Also in the back of the old Sacramentary were three very simple – very beautiful <u>Eucharistic Prayers for Masses with Children</u>. As the Lord says, "Let the children come unto me." We can certainly learn much from the pure simplicity of children, because in our lives of prayer – keeping it simple is usually the best option. Here are the three very simple – very direct orations to the dead that we can add to the above repertoire of prayers for the coming weeks: (I) "Lord, you never forget your children. We ask you to take care of those we love, especially we pray for those who have died." (II) "Remember those who have died. Bring them home to you to be with you for ever." (III) "Bring us all at last to live with you and to be one with Christ in heaven."

I encourage you to say these prayers – perhaps just one every day or a combination not only in November, but all the time – so that we may never forget the countless men and women – those known to us and those known only to



the heart of God – may intercede for us in heaven; that we will see them again at the banquet that will never end. If you have photographs of loved ones and friends who have died – put them out and light a votive candle next to them. If a person or persons are buried at a nearby cemetery – take some time before the snow comes and say a little prayer for their soul, especially those often ignored graves that have no one to care for them any longer – they especially need our prayers. If you know an individual who may be near death themselves – go to them, hold their hand, and pray that St. Joseph, our beloved patron of a happy death, will be with them and God will welcome them into the peace of his kingdom. The dead are never truly gone – they live in our minds, hearts and souls – they remind us of the faith, hope and love that fuel

our mortal existence readying us to our eternal existence – they are preparing the way to welcome us for our heavenly reward. Pray for the dead – ALL THE DEAD – this month, and may perpetual light always shine on them! AMEN!

#### SAINT OF THE WEEK – EXAMPLES OF OUR FAITH

#### St. Elizabeth of Hungary | Feast Day November 17

Although her life was short, St. Elizabeth of Hungary (1207 – 1231) is recognized for her love of the poor and suffering, and as patroness of Catholic charities and the Secular Franciscan Order. The daughter of the King of Hungary, she chose a life of penance instead of leisure, which made an impact on the "commoners" she served.

St. Elizabeth married Louis of Thuringia when she was 14. Deeply in love, they had three children. Despite their wealth, she led a life of prayer, sacrifice, and service to the poor and sick under the spiritual direction of a Franciscan friar.

After six years of marriage, her husband died in the Crusades, and St. Elizabeth was grief-stricken. Her husband's family did not look kindly upon her and mistreated her before finally throwing her out of the palace. However, the return of her husband's allies from the Crusades resulted in her being reinstated, since her son was legal heir to the throne. St. Elizabeth joined the Secular Franciscan Order in 1228 where she cared for the poor in a hospital she founded in honor of St. Francis of Assisi. She died in 1231, but her great popularity resulted in her being named a saint only four years later. ©LPi

#### RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

#### **Giving Until it Hurts**

In the time of Christ, sacrifice was nothing new to the Jewish people. The Israelites were experts at sacrifice. So, after centuries of every kind of offering imaginable, what was so special about Christ's? What made it so different from the sacrifices offered by the Levitical priests for centuries before his death?

Well, to adequately answer that question would consume whole volumes. And, of course, the first and most important reason is that Christ was the son of God and the savior of the world, not a random (if "unblemished") lamb offering. It was only by the blood of Christ that we could be redeemed.

But another answer is this: Christ's sacrifice cost him. In fact, it cost him everything. The offerings made by the Israelites through their priests cost them too, of course. They gave of their flocks, of their household stores, of their wealth. But Christ gave differently. He gave of himself. He gave until it was all gone.

Such is the highest form of stewardship: the gift of self to the point of discomfort. It can take a multitude of forms and I am not saying we are all called to be nailed to the cross. In fact, for most of us, our gifts will not involve physical discomfort at all. But certainly, stewardship demands discomfort. It demands that we go against our human nature of putting ourselves first, of thinking primarily of our own needs and desires. And most of all, it demands love. For that, above all else, distinguished the gift Christ gave us.
