From the Pastor's Desk

II - Easter Reflection Series on the Paschal Candle: The Fire & The Light

My dear parish family:

The Paschal candle is a rich symbol of our faith. It is most prominent at Easter. Each year during the Easter Vigil service on Holy Saturday night, a new fire is blessed in churches all around the world. This new fire serves as an image of the Resurrection. In case you weren't able to be at the Easter Vigil or hear the prayer I said over the fire, here it is again: "Let us pray. O God, who through your Son bestowed upon the faithful the fire of your glory, sanctify + this new fire, we pray, and grant that, by these paschal celebrations, we may be so inflamed with heavenly desires, that with minds made pure we may attain festivities of unending splendor. Through Christ our Lord. Amen."

After the fire was blessed the Paschal Candle was prepared and then lit by this new fire. I said the following then at the Vigil: "May the light of Christ rising in glory dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds." The warmth of Christ's love in the new fire then lit our way, literally, as His light began to fill our darkened church, world, and lives.

This ritual every night on Holy Saturday has been reenacted each year for centuries. Yes, the "holy darkness" gives way to the Light of Christ. In a time without streetlamps and electric lights, the darkness was surely quite significant. The Church is empty and dark. The Church is indeed decorated for the great feast of Easter, the holy water fonts remain empty and the candles are extinguished. Then comes the fire – the light – the presence of the Risen Jesus!



As the fire that will eventually light the wick of the Paschal Candle in order to shed its light on the darkness and emptiness, we, the People of God, wait to meet Christ. He is still within the tomb; His soul remains in the Underworld with the faithful souls of the dead who are awaiting the moment when they be free and rise through the doors to heaven that had been locked since Adam and Eve's downfall. Then suddenly unlit candles are blazing bright and realization that it is Easter, that Jesus is no longer a cold inanimate corpse in the tomb, that the Resurrection promised has once again come true! The fire lighting the Paschal Candle let's us see. Yes, that pillar of wax made by the melting wax of bees, fed by mother bees (remember last week), leads the way.

Every Easter vigil that I can remember from when I sang in the choir in elementary school in my home parish to when I was an altar server there next to my pastor at the fire. Each night of Holy Saturday of my nearly 15 years of ordained ministry, when that Paschal Candle is finally placed in the gold candlestick, there out in the dark, is a sea of tiny lights flickering together. The glow every year is awe-inspiring! Just think if the light of Christ is that spectacular in just one church on that night, then what would the entire Christian world look like at that moment? It must be pretty close to heaven-like! As one of the popular songs from my childhood in the 1980s sang, the Easter Vigil – that candle on fire: "heaven is a

place on earth!" (The photo this week is courtesy of my mother's camera!)

As I said in my homily on Easter Sunday, quoting John F. Kennedy, who quotes the famous line: "It is better to light a candle than curse the darkness." In addition, as the late former president George H.W. Bush oft-quoted line reverberates: "a thousand points of light." The world, the Church, the human family, we individually need – require – absolutely must keep within us – the light of Christ. Each time we look at the Paschal Candle in our church, whether it's at a baptism or funeral, prominently displayed as it is right now in the sanctuary for Easter – or just passing by it in Gathering Space, as it waits patiently for the fire again; let us pray for the warmth of the fire of Christ's love to be kindled and rekindles over and over again in our hearts. Yes, let us pray for the light of the Risen Jesus to dispel the darkness and show us the way home, where we will be with Him in an Easter morning that will never end! Amen!

May these 50 days of Easter light bring us hope and joy! Father Justin

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP -- How to Fail Your Way to Heaven

You know what are some of my favorite moments in Scripture? The little "Easter eggs" of Jesus' humanity, things like Jesus falling asleep, Jesus drawing in the sand, Jesus playing with kids. And how about Jesus rising from the dead, appearing to his disciples and saying, "So, have you got anything to eat?"

It's right for us to always keep in mind that Jesus is God. But we also have to remember that he was man. He got hungry. He cried when he felt sad and laughed when he felt happy. He got tired. He got bored.

Because he was God, none of those feelings ever led him into sin, like they do us. He never spent a car ride trying to pass the hours by seeing how annoyed he could make his older sister. He never smacked Peter over the head for saying something really stupid. But he did unleash some Biblically righteous anger on those traders in the temple, didn't he? And he wasn't shy about calling Peter "a Satan" when his friend tempted him to take the easy way out.

It's the tightrope walk we all try to balance every day, honoring our human emotions while still answering God's call to be better. Being perfect isn't the domain of the Christian — that's the domain of Christ only. Trying and failing, then trying again (and failing again) and again and again? That's the domain of the Christian.


