From the Pastor's Desk

### THE "PHANTOMS OF THE PASSION" LENTEN REFLECTION SERIES (PART 4 OF 5) VERONICA: Will You Wipe His Bloody Face?

My dear parish family:

We cannot read in Sacred Scripture this week, for our next person we find on the road of the Passion – Veronica – for she is not mentioned in the Gospels. Yet her encounter with Christ – memorialized in the Sixth Station – has become a part of our Tradition. Yes, it is after Simon has helped to carry the Cross and just before the Lord falls to the ground again, does this woman come forward to wipe His face with her veil.

Growing up in my small country home parish, my family and I prayed the Stations of the Cross every Wednesday night during Lent with the rest of the parish. My pastor would use a version called *Everyone's Way of the Cross* by Clarence Enzler. We have used here at Saint Leo in previous years. It is a more contemporary Way of the Cross in which Jesus speaks first, always referring to us as "His other self" then those assembled reply. Since there are no scriptural words for Veronica, I offer the words from those stations for our mediation this week.



Christ speaks: "CAN YOU BE BRAVE ENOUGH, MY OTHER SELF, TO WIPE MY BLOODY FACE? WHERE IS MY FACE, YOU ASK? AT HOME WHENEVER EYES FILL UP WITH TEARS, AT WORK WHEN TENSIONS RISE, ON PLAYGROUNDS, IN THE SLUMS, THE COURTS, THE HOSPITALS, THE JAILS – WHEREVER SUFFERING EXISTS – MY FACE IS THERE. AND THERE I LOOK FOR YOU TO WIPE AWAY MY BLOOD AND TEARS."

### We reply: "LORD, WHAT YOU ASK IS HARD. IT CALLS FOR COURAGE AND SELF SACRIFICE, AND I AM WEAK. PLEASE, GIVE ME STRENGTH. DON'T LET ME RUN AWAY BECAUSE OF FEAR. LORD, LIVE IN ME AND ACT IN ME AND LOVE IN ME. AND NOT IN ME ALONE – IN ALL OF US – SO THAT WE MAY REVEAL NO MORE YOUR BLOODY BUT YOUR GLORIOUS FACE OF EARTH."

think we should read Jesus' words again, so please do so. Quite the heart wrenching mediation is it not? Moreover, Lent should be heart wrenching – it needs to pull us into an uncomfortable place so we can reassess our attitudes. Lent, more so than any other time during the liturgical year, is a time to look at the bleeding and beaten face of Christ. We are so used to looking at images of Jesus in churches, books and in art that is pleasing to us. I have always referred to that as the "cosmetic Christ." There is not much blood or wounds – there are not many scars. What Christ's face truly looked like on the road to Calvary was much different from what we paint it. His face was not angelic – not illuminated – not clean. After being beaten and kicked – slapped and spit on – punched and prodded – it would have looked guite grotesque and frightening. Imagine that little baby born in a manger – whose smile and eyes I am sure would light up a room – that face was now black and blue and his eyes filled with blood and tears – beaten, bruised and broken for the sins of the world.

Nevertheless, Veronica was not afraid to approach Jesus. She was not fearful of touching His face. In addition, with the gentlest of actions she wiped away some of the blood – some of the tears – some of the pain. Do we have the confidence – the faith – the love to do the same? God gives us the courage – He gave His Son the courage, but do we take advantage of it? Can we look at the wounds bleeding on His face put there by the sinfulness of the world? Can we touch the forehead pierced by the thorns of hatred and division and pulled them out? Can we look with our imperfect human eyes into the bloodshot eyes of Christ to accept His forgiveness and mercy? I am certain that Veronica asked herself those same questions and she said, "YES!" We must do the same. I reiterate the words of Christ, as written by Clarence Enzler, above: "Can you be brave enough, my other self, to wipe my bloody face?" Well, are we?
