# <u>SOLEMNITY OF THE</u> <u>EPIPHANY</u>

Today, January 3rd, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Epiphany. The Epiphany takes its name from a Greek word meaning: an appearance or a revelation. This feast day celebrates the revelation of the son of God as a human being. The Epiphany represents three themes: divine manifestation, royal kingship, and light. What the Church reveals today is the manifestation of our Lord to the whole world; after being made known to the shepherds of Bethlehem He is revealed to the Magi who have come from the East to adore Him. Like the wise men, all Christians should have the courage to follow the light of our faith; recognize our Lord as Ruler, in whatever unexpected way He may present Himself to us; and bow down and adore Him, offering Him our total loyalty. This feast day is an affirmation of universal salvation.



# 48<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF ROE V. WADE, JAN. 22nd

In January 1973, the Supreme Court of the United States gave our nation Roe v. Wade and its companion decision Doe v. Bolton, and in so doing effectively removed every legal protection from human beings prior to birth. The legacy of *Roe* is virtually incalculable. In its wake it has left death and sorrow and turmoil. Millions of lives have been destroyed before birth and even during the very process of being born. Countless women have been traumatized so deeply by abortion that they spend years struggling to find peace, healing, and reconciliation. Men grieve because they could not "choose" to protect a child they helped bring into existence. We pray that the Lord enlighten the eves of our hearts and lead our nation out of the darkness of the decision to legalize abortion 47 years ago. We pray for those whom we'll never know, and we prav for their mothers and fathers

who have suffered this loss.

# <u>CHRISTIAN UNITY</u> <u>WEEK</u> JANUARY 18-25, 2021

The theme for the 2021 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is *"Abide in My Love... You Shall Bear Much Fruit."* It was discerned by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland and finds its origins in the Gospel of John (cf. John 15:1-17)."Jesus gave his life for all out of his love for all," said Fr. James Loughran, SA, Director of Graymoor Ecumenical & Interreligious Institute (GEII).

"To abide in his love reminds us that we live in a community celebrating our gift of unity."

"In these days of the Coronavirus threat, our world has become smaller," said Fr. James Loughran, SA. "We are one in our response. More than ever, we need to

appreciate the value of Christian unity." The traditional period for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is January 18-25. Those dates were proposed by Servant

of God, Fr. Paul Wattson, SA, founder of the Society of the Atonement, who initiated observance of the first "Church Unity Octave" in 1908, to cover the original days of the feasts of the Chair of St. Peter (Jan. 18) and the Conversion of St. Paul (Jan. 25), and therefore have a symbolic significance.
