Archbishop Fulton Sheen said, "It takes three to make love, not two: you, your spouse, and God." Apart from the incarnation of God in Jesus Christ, nothing speaks better of God's incarnate love than marriage. What we fail to realize, however, is that love is not simply part of the human package deal. Love comes from God. It is one of God's greatest gifts to human beings. When we begin to realize that our very ability to love is sacred, it changes up how we see the essence of life, and purpose and sanctity of marriage.

God is love. It stands to reason then that if we follow the path of unconditional, self-emptying love we will then stumble upon God. It is precisely this intimate wedding of God with love that gives such eloquence and honor to the love between husband and wife. As a living sign of Christ's love for the Church and for humanity, husbands and wives speak volumes of God's unconditional incarnate love for all of his children! The Divine power that brings unity and life to marriage is so strong that once joined, it really cannot be separated.

Admittedly, marriage covenants can be extremely difficult to negotiate and, at times, very painful to experience. God's perfect divinity always meets our broken and imperfect humanity. Our loving is never as unconditional as God's and often tainted by our own imperfections, needs, memories, hurts, sinfulness, and weakness. All of this baggage negatively impacts even the most well-intentioned marriages, causing them to be hurtful and empty. We are love works in progress. God can succeed in perfecting our love only if we keep our eyes fixed on him as the source of that love. That's why marriage is always about three and not just two.

The Divine intimacy at the heart of marriage is what can make them celebrations of great union and happiness. Couples who are still madly in love with each other after many years, still looking at each other with that timeless twinkle in their eyes, best tell the story of God's oneness with humanity. Honor, celebrate, and support those who have accepted a vocation to marriage. Living in a world that easily pulls relationships apart, may they find hope and inspiration from their faith companions who are on the same journey!

Sacrament of Matrimony: Before a date can be scheduled, a priest must be contacted at least six months in advance to complete the required documents.

Sacrament of the Sick: Communal celebrations of Anointing the Sick are scheduled periodically. The sacrament can also be requested by any parishioner who is seriously ill or in danger of death. *Please note*: Federal law no longer permits hospitals or nursing homes to contact churches when a parishioner is admitted. It is important that family members notify the parish office if a loved one needs a visit, desires to receive Holy Communion, or needs to be Anointed.

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

THIS WEEK IN HISTORY: OUR FIRST PASTOR

On December 6, 1903, Father Matysiak was appointed pastor of Holy Trinity Church. The zeal and energy of his work was made immediately evident in his new labors. He selected a church committee of three members—Mr. Adalbert Skibinski, Mr. Anthony Donikowski, and Mr. Francis Nowak. There was no rectory and Father Matysiak lived in a home, which was fully two blocks away from the church. With the cooperation of his committee plans were evolved, whereby a combination school and rectory could be constructed for a minimum expenditure. The first plan presented a two-story building at the estimated cost of \$4,500.00, but the committee suggested that a small meeting hall could be constructed in the basement to serve as a parish hall, and in case of necessity could be used as an extra classroom. This change brought about the estimated cost of \$6,000.00. During the building of this xhool and rectory, Father Matysiak contributed both his time and his labor. When on September 10, 1904, this building was not only completed, but also furnished, great pride and satisfaction was commonly shared by the loving parishioners and their zealous pastor. The rectory and school consisted of ten spacious rooms with a large assembly hall in the basement. The living quarters were completely furnished, including an ultra-modern bathroom with a new modern water heating equipment. This modern heating equipment, no one then realized, was to be the cause of a stunning catastrophe. With the successful completion of the rectory, Father Matysiak decided to hold the first Mission in his church. Missionary Fathers were invited to conduct the mission, which opened on Oct. 3, 1904. At this time the most Rev. Bishop Fitzmaurice arrived to bless the new school and expressed joy and satisfaction at the progress made in such a short time. At the conclusion of the mission, which lasted one week, Father Matysiak held his first Forty-Hour Devotion. He invited, as is customary, other priests of the diocese. On the evening of October 10, after evening devotions, leaving his guests, he expressed being fatigued would take a bath to refresh himself. When the pastor did not return for a long time, the visiting fathers expressed surprise, then suspicion. Upon investigating they found Father Matysiak, his bath completed and dressed, lying prone on the floor and gasping for air. All efforts to revive him failed. He died from monoxide poisoning at one o'clock, the 11th of October, 1904.



To this day, Dominican sisters, brothers, and priests stress the Rosary, and millions find meditation, consolation, and community through it. Why not say a decade of the Rosary right now and tap into its centuries-old strength?

On October 8, 1871, winds swept across the dry Midwestern prairie and helped fan the flames of the Great Chicago Fire and dozens of lesser-known fires, including the Pestigo, Wisconsin Firestorm that ranks as the deadliest wildfire in U.S. history. Local parish priest Father John-Peter Pernin wrote an eyewitness account titled The Finger of God is There! His interpretation of events captures the theological struggle believers face amid tragedy: On the one hand, he sees a judging God striking down a people for their sinfulness; on the other, he sees a merciful God filling people with hope and the promise of new life. May the finger


