It's all about reconciliation and conversion, not punishment. Relationships are not static adventures but wonderful gifts that continue to develop, grow, change, and mature. We are meant to be social beings, so isolating ourselves from others is rarely helpful. But, because human beings are on the one hand tremendously gifted, talented, and blessed creations, they are on the other also flawed, broken, and sinful. We all need to humbly admit that we are works in progress and not only capable of enriching each other's lives but causing deep hurts and wounds as well. Hence, we always need to be reconciled.

Because reconciliation and conversion are always part of the mix of life, honesty is crucial. Without honesty, we can easily find ourselves living a lie and causing more harm than good. Being able to freely share our feelings, especially those involving pain and hurt, is a charism necessary to pursue and an art to learn. When we are wronged or wrong someone else, we do not enjoy the confrontation that can and needs to come. We are taught to keep our feelings to ourselves, especially when they are negative, and we tend to avoid difficult conversations. Hence, we never really learn how to confront another, successfully resolve conflict, find reconciliation, and welcome conversion. When we hurt or wrong someone, it does not mean that we are a bad or sinful person who deserves only punishment and excommunication. Quite the opposite! We are simply a human person who can make poor choices and sin and can be forgiven. We can restore and deepen the relationship that has been affected and find our way home again.

Jesus clearly wants to avoid shame because it has no purpose in achieving reconciliation and conversion. All broken relationships deserve a chance at reconciliation. Every person has room for growth and a need for conversion. We have to learn to be okay with honesty and not be afraid to hear and process what someone needs to say, even if it is difficult for us to hear. Severing a relationship, both personally or with the church community as a whole, ought to definitely be a last resort and only pursued when all else has failed.

Sacrament of Holy Orders: God calls all people to holiness. Some men are called to fulfill this vocation as priests. If you are interested in the priesthood, or have questions about it, please contact a parish priest or our Diocesan Vocation Director, Fr. Michael Polenik, at 1.800.374.3723.

Sacrament of Matrimony: Before a date can be scheduled, a priest must be contacted at least six months in advance to complete the required documents.

Sacrament of the Sick: Communal celebrations of Anointing the Sick are scheduled periodically. The sacrament can also be requested by any parishioner who is seriously ill or in danger of death. *Please note*: Federal law no longer permits hospitals or nursing homes to contact churches when a parishioner is admitted. It is important that family members notify the parish office if a loved one needs a visit, desires to receive Holy Communion, or needs to be Anointed.

REMEMBERING 9/11/01

September 11th, 2001, is a day that will forever stick in the minds of most Americans, but for many young people 9/11 is no longer a current event but a historical one. How do we teach this event that has forever altered so many aspects of American life from our military conflicts to persistent Islamophobia to government surveillance? At present, 9/11 sits on the edge of history and current event with most students being born after but with many families still being affected. 2020 marks the 19th anniversary of 9/11. In New York, ongoing focus remains on the new One World Trade Center in downtown Manhattan, the tallest building in the Western hemisphere at 1,776 feet. The single skyscraper replaces the iconic Twin Towers, destroyed on September 11, 2001 -- marking the first ever attack on US soil. Solemn ceremonies and events are planned every year to mark the day.

Today's readings are all about relationships. Among the many lessons we have learned from the global pandemic is the deep importance of the relationships and communities in our lives. Our families, neighbors, friends and parish family need us, and we need them to be our best selves.

St. Paul gives us simple instruction in our second reading from Romans to guide us in our dealings with others, reminding us what Christ Himself taught: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Love is the overarching principal that guides us to be good stewards of our relationships.

In our Gospel passage from Matthew, Jesus further refines this instruction on good stewardship of our relationships, even when they involve conflict. He says, "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have won over your brother."

Jesus teaches us to confront the offending person directly and discretely — with the goal of restoring the relationship if possible. This is how we steward our relationships even through rocky waters. Jesus also speaks to us of the power and beauty of community life. "If two of you agree on earth about anything for which they are to pray, it shall be granted by my heavenly Father. For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

Christian stewards, God has designed us in such a way that we must help each other on the journey towards heaven. Let us take care to steward our relationships well.

Strive for rugged interdependence Ezekiel 33:7-9; Romans 13:8-10; Matthew 18:15-20 "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."

Individualism—rugged or otherwise—has it perks. But what's more rugged and infinitely more fruitful is the spirit of communal interdependence. Jesus tells us not merely that there's safety in numbers, but that Christianity itself is in the balance. A loner Christian simply can't be found. Even a hermit lives in communion with the greater church. Our gathering hymn at the start of each Mass tells us why we come together, whether in person or online: because Jesus is present in the love that passes between us. Practice your Christianity in all of your daily contacts.

Stand for work

1 Corinthians 5:1-8; Luke 6:6-11 *"Is it lawful to do good on the sabbath rather than to do evil?"*

This year's Labor Day is a difficult one for our country, with so many workers unemployed, underemployed, or employed in high-risk settings as a result of the pandemic. In these tough times, let's remember the church's teachings on the dignity of work and workers. The U.S. bishops have stated, "All people have the right to economic initiative, to productive work, to just wages and benefits, to decent working conditions, as well as to organize and join unions or other associations." Stand up for workers' rights today and every day.

Tuesday, Sep 08, 2020

FEAST OF THE NATIVITY OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY **Find hope in Mary** Micah 5:1-4a or Romans 8:28-30; Matthew 1:1-16, 18-23 *"Of her was born Jesus who is called the Christ."*

One of the most beautiful prayers of the Catholic Church, "The Litany of Loreto" dates back to the 1500s and uses poetic language to proclaim the many titles and symbols of Mary. One of those symbols—Mary as Morning Star—describes Our Lady's relationship to Jesus and her role in salvation history. Just as Earth's morning star, Venus, emits the day's first light ahead of the dawning of the sun, so too does the birth of Mary provide a glimmer of hope ahead of the birth of her son. Turn to Mary today with anything you might feel hopeless about.

Wednesday, Sep 09, 2020 MEMORIAL OF PETER CLAVER, PRIEST Care about body and soul 1 Corinthians 7:25-31; Luke 6:20-26

"Blessed are you when people hate you and insult you." Saint Peter Claver (1581-1654) was a Spanish Jesuit missionary to the Americas who preached the Good News by first caring for the physical needs of the people. When slave ships docked in the port city of Cartagena, Colombia, Claver came with food and medicines to care for the African people who survived the journey, because he believed that, "We must speak to them with our hands before we speak to them with our lips." In four decades in Colombia, he baptized more than 300,000 people, proof perhaps that compassion borne of faith is the best means of evangelization. May compassion for everyone be the means of our own sainthood.

Thursday, Sep 10, 2020 Bible banter

1 Corinthians 8:1b-7, 11-13; Luke 6:27-38 "Forgive and you will be forgiven. Give and gifts will be given to you."

While we may quote the Bible now and then, Catholics in general are less likely to quote scripture than many Protestants, not because we don't value scripture but because Catholics rely on tradition and teaching *alongside* scripture. Individual Bible quotes tend to be emphasized less. Most believers will spend a lifetime coming to understand and embrace their faith deeply. Next time you read the Bible, see it as one more step on the journey to God.

Friday, Sep 11, 2020 What would Jesus do?

1 Corinthians 9:16-19, 22b-27; Luke 6:39-42 "Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own?"

Religion has too often been weaponized. Criticism and even attacks on others are justified in the name of "God." Many a "holy" war has been fought with little understanding of a God who can be expressed as compassion, mercy, and love in many and varied ways across religious traditions. As Christians, we are called to measure our words and actions by the gospel of Jesus the Christ. This standard should guide our choices, whether confronting injustice, voting for political leadership, or encountering a stranger. As we pause to remember the victims of 9/11 and other terrorist acts today, let's pledge to resist all efforts to weaponize religion. How can love incarnate your entire being?

Saturday, Sep 12, 2020 MEMORIAL OF THE MOST HOLY NAME OF MARY Your litany of personal saints

1 Corinthians 10:14-22; Luke 6:43-49 "No good tree bears bad fruit... for each tree is known by its own fruit."

Tony in *West Side Story* wasn't the first to sing the name of his beloved, and the word "Maria" barely contains his wonder. So is it any surprise that those who revere the Virgin Mary have cherished her name for centuries? Take a moment to create a list of names, your personal litany of people who have nourished or inspired you. Then pray it in thanksgiving for them.
