

31ST SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME

Christ loves us first. So much of the Christian life is as simple as that. Todav's Gospel is a prime example! "Now a man there named Zacchaeus. who was a chief tax collector and also a wealthy man ... was seeking to see who Jesus was." We may have gotten used to the story of Zacchaeus, this short, seemingly innocent man who climbs a sycamore tree in his desperate desire to see Jesus. But this colorful, children's Bible illustration isn't what the gathering crowd would have seen. They would have seen the white collar criminal. Tax collectors were notorious for extortion. They were collaborators with the oppressive Roman overlords, overcharging for taxes and skimming a cut off the top. And how does Jesus respond to this man?

"Come down quickly," Jesus says, "for today I must stay at your house." If you had been there, would you have believed it? No doubt there were other disciples in the city or, at the very least, kind, generous, and just people. "Good" people. But those aren't the people Jesus chooses to share a meal with. Christ loves us first. He chooses Zacchaeus even before the man makes a public profession of his repentance.

"The Son of Man has come to seek and to save what was lost." We may not be tax collectors and extortionists I hope not! — but we all have elements of our lives that are lost. We have wounds from childhood, unresolved anxieties or attachments, daily fears. No matter how "put together" we are, we all have our lost moments. Some days, it may feel like we can't see over the ways they crowd our inner life. Today's Gospel invites us to do something a little strange. Don't let your flaws, failures, or hang-ups prevent you from seeing Jesus. Take a deep breath. Go climb a tree, because Jesus is passing by. And he wants to stay in your heart today.

Confirmation preparation for all eastside Erie parishes is hosted at Saint John's Church. Contact their parish office for more information and to register your child (814.454.2873).

Sacrament of Holy Orders: God calls all people to holiness. Some men are called to fulfill this vocation as priests. If you are interested in the priesthood, or have questions about it, please contact a parish priest or our Diocesan Vocation Director, Fr. Michael Polenik, at 1.800.374.3723.

Sacrament of Matrimony: Before a date can be scheduled, a priest must be contacted at least six months in advance to complete the required documents.

Sacrament of the Sick: Communial celebrations of Anointing the Sick are scheduled periodically. The sacrament can also be requested by any parishioner who is seriously ill or in danger of death. *Please note*: Federal law no longer permits hospitals or nursing homes to contact churches when a parishioner is admitted. It is incumbent upon family members to notify the parish office if a loved one needs a visit, desires to receive Holy Communion, or needs Anointed.

Leave A Legacy: Consider Saint Stanislaus and Holy Trinity as you meet with your attorney or financial planner regarding your estate planning. Remember the needs of your parish family and leave a legacy of faith for future generations with your generous remembrance.

Bulletin Information Deadline: Please submit information to be included in the weekend bulletin by noon the Monday prior. Holiday bulletin announcements must be received by the parish office two weeks in advance.

National Vocations Awareness Week

As Catholics, we firmly believe that God has a plan for our lives! He calls some to marriage, some to the priesthood, and others to religious life. Some remain as generous single people. Fully living our own vocations - and teaching young people how to discern God's call - is a serious duty, but also a joyful one. Today begins National Vocation Awareness Week. During this week, please pray about how God is calling you to live your vocation more deeply. Encourage the young people in your life - children, grandchildren, students, and friends - to be open if God calls them to priesthood or consecrated life.

How Parents Can Nurture Vocations

Set an example: Model discipleship and a loving marriage to your children.

Seek role models: Befriend priests, sisters, and brothers and invite them to your home.

Look to scripture: Read and discuss the Bible stories of Mary's response to God (Luke 1:26-39), and Jesus calling the Apostles (Mt 4:18-22).

Pray for the future: Pray aloud that your children will follow Jesus and remain open to holy marriage, priesthood, and religious life.

If your child does express interest in the priesthood or religious life, be supportive. The best thing you can say is, "Whatever God wants for you, I want for you, too. Just keep praying to discover His will for your life."

In families we sometimes stop at the wrong places. It is wisdom to "pass through" annoying family situations so we can enjoy the goodness of each other.

Some will say that to truly be humble means to act anonymously, but we are not speaking here of actions that call out, "Look at me!" We are talking about acting in a way that people see not you and me, but Jesus instead. We are to be models and examples to one another. We are to build up one another and make the Body of Christ strong. Don't sit back wishing you had the strength to be a saint. You have already been given the gifts needed to be the saint you are called to be. Maybe people will read about you later, but the Church needs you now!

You only live once

Wisdom 11:22-12:2; 2 Thessalonians 1:11-2:2; Luke 19:1-10 "...that our God may make you worthy of his calling."

"Somehow, my heart has been made to hold the world." Sister of Charity Tracy Kemme explains her attraction to religious life with these words. In a book of essays by young women religious, In Our Own Words: Religious Life in a Changing World, she and other recently professed sisters describe what it means for them to "go big or go home" in life's great adventure. Kemme quotes T.S. Eliot: "Only those who will risk going too far can possibly find out how far one can go." As Vocation Awareness Week begins, consider how far you're prepared to go.

MEMORIAL OF CHARLES BORROMEO, BISHOP

Out-of-synch saint

Romans 11:29-36; Luke 14:12-14 "...invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind."

With Vocation Awareness Week underway, we celebrate the 16th-century Italian Charles Borromeo, who was pretty sure of his vocation by the age of 12. As he grew in understanding of who he was called to be, he gave away his wealth and dedicated himself to service of the poor. He was made a cardinal by his uncle, Pope Pius IV. After that, in order to become the archbishop of Milan, he was ordained a priest. (An unusual sequence but possible at that time.) A zealous reformer of the church, he died at the age of 43 but was made a saint 26 years later. All are called to serve and to the sainthood of all believers. Consider your own vocation - have you found it yet?

Tuesday, Nov 05, 2019 It starts with a good word

Romans 12:5-16b; Luke 14:15-24

"Go out to the highways and hedgerows and make people come in that my home may be filled."

Did you know that a surprising number of sisters, brothers, and priests say that they first considered a vocation to religious life simply because someone - a teacher, friend, or relative - suggested it to them? Did someone point out to you early in life that you'd be good at sales or carpentry or design - or whatever it is you now do for a living? Do the same for a young person you know, if you see in them qualities that would suit them to religious life. You might be planting the seed of a future vocation.

Wednesday, Nov 06, 2019 Hold things lightly

Romans 13:8-10; Luke 14:25-33 "Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple."

Today is the middle of National Vocation Awareness Week, a good time for people from all walks of life to consider their calling. At the same time, today's gospel does not soften a hard message that no matter our calling, all disciples should hold lightly to both family and possessions. While the vows and promises priests, sisters, and brothers make involve renunciation of possessions and often mean less family contact, Christians in every walk of life may be required to turn from family and let goof belongings at some point. In your prayer today, consider what sacrifices your life path has required—and what joys it has brought you.

Thursday, Nov 07, 2019

Go ahead, be a loser!

Romans 14:7-12; Luke 15:1-10

"None of us lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself."

Even though the U.S. Catholic Church is promoting Vocation Awareness Week - for vocations to the priesthood and religious life - it's also an opportunity for everyone to reflect upon their own vocation in life, to re-examine their larger philosophy of life. While it's true that Jesus uses parables that describe the joy of finding lost thing - the shepherd who searches for one of 100 sheep, the woman who scours her home for one of 10

100 sheep, the woman who scours her home for one of 10 coins - Jesus also says we must lose our life to keep it. Who, me? A martyr? Not necessarily. But in a world that fosters self-centeredness, we can practice acts of self-sacrifice. Some even call it "dying before we die," the "white martyrdom" of saints in heaven - but also the saints who live nearby.

Friday, Nov 08, 2019 Let the Spirit guide you

Romans 15:14-21; Luke 16:1-8 "... by the power of God's Spirit."

Jesus promised his disciples that after he left this earth, his Spirit would continue to be with them. Those who believe in Jesus and try to live as he did are the disciples of today. So when we struggle with a problem, face a difficult decision, or are worried about life's events, we too can count on the Spirit of Jesus, God's

Holy Spirit, for wisdom and consolation. Any and every day is the time to call on the promised Spirit. Take a moment in quiet prayer today to ask God's Spirit to lead you through the day.
