As adults, unless we are dealing with children, "obedience" is not a word we typically like to hear. It often brings connotations of military protocols, deference to superiors at work, or conforming to laws and practices. In a culture that has learned to challenge authority, being obedient is understood more as something I "have" to do, not "want" to do. Do you ever see merit in wanting to be obedient? Encouraged to develop independent, self-sufficient egos and personas, we learn to focus on our own wills and merits as we strive for success and achieve a sense of well-being. Giving ourselves over to the will of another, especially when done blindly, can sometimes carry more risk than we are willing to take. Also, blindly following orders without any

St. Ignatius of Loyola states, "There are three sorts of obedience; the first, obedience when a strict obligation is imposed upon us, and this is good; the second when the simple word of the superior, without any strict command, suffices for us, and this is better; the third, when a thing is done without waiting for an express command, from a knowledge that it will be pleasing to the superior, and this is the best of all." St. Ignatius sees obedience as an act of love. When the person we are obeying genuinely has our best interest in mind, acting themselves with love and integrity, then what St. Ignatius says makes excellent sense. When mutual trust and a bond of love and respect are present, obedience can lead to freedom and truth.

We ask God to increase our faith. In other words, increase our trust that God knows best how to live and act in this world. We desire the same confidence, determination, and patience Jesus had that the fulfillment of God's vision would one day come. Nurturing a deep love of God and trusting in his providence, we obediently do what we know is pleasing to God: love, repent of sin, show mercy, be compassionate and fight injustice. As we willingly give witness to our faith, we do only what we are obliged to do, expecting nothing in return. Spared from the task of having to figure it all out for ourselves, we discover freedom.

Sacrament of Holy Orders: God calls all people to holiness. Some men are called to fulfill this vocation as priests. If you are interested in the priesthood, or have questions about it, please contact a parish priest or our Diocesan Vocation Director, Scott Jabo, at 1.814.824.1181.

Sacrament of Matrimony: Before a date can be scheduled, a priest must be contacted at least six months in advance to complete the required documents.

Sacrament of the Sick: Communal celebrations of Anointing the Sick are scheduled periodically. The sacrament can also be requested by any parishioner who is seriously ill or in danger of death. *Please note*: Federal law no longer permits hospitals or nursing homes to contact churches when a parishioner is admitted. It is important that family members notify the parish office if a loved one needs a visit, desires to receive Holy Communion, or needs to be Anointed.

Be Careful What You Wish For

You've probably heard the phrase "Be careful what you wish for." In my experience, it's not often utilized with a lot of charity. You usually hear it said as a warning. The unspoken sentiment behind it is this: You're not as strong as you think you are. As Christians we shouldn't be surprised to look ourselves in the mirror and own that reality. We are not as strong as we may think. We are time and time again shocked and dismayed by our own weaknesses, our own fears, our own shortcomings. Should we be careful what we wish for? The apostles asked Jesus to increase their faith, and He told them it would take work. It would take suffering. It would take patience. But He didn't say it was impossible. As everyday stewards, we need to continue wishing recklessly. Ask God for anything and everything, come to Him with all your needs. Beg Him for grace without limit. When we hear God's voice, it does not always say what we want to hear. But it always speaks the perfect truth. If it tells us of a hardship that we think we cannot bear, let us take solace in the knowledge that we are the stewards — not the landlord.

CELEBRATING OUR POLISH-AMERICAN HERITAGE



The first pastor of Holy Trinity was Rev. Vincent Matysiak who was born near Gniezno, Poland in 1868. He was ordained in Texas in 1899 and was assigned to the Polish communities of Texas. He was later transferred to the Diocese of Erie and became pastor of St. Barbara's in Houtzdale.

Upon the founding of Holy Trinity Parish in 1903, Rev. Matysiak became its first pastor. Since there was not yet a rectory, he lived in a home two blocks away while a combination school and rectory was being built.

A week's mission was opened on October 3, 1904. This included the forty hours devotion. Bishop Fitzmaurice blessed the new school/rectory during the course of the mission. Among the priests attending the mission was Rev. Seweryn Niedbalski, a dear friend of Rev. Matysiak from Texas.

A Mustard Seed Faith

The puzzle is based on Luke 17:5-10 (NIV).

HGTPMPWOKUY

According to Waclaw Kruszka's Historya Polska w Ameryce (A History of the Poles in America: Published in 1908.) "At the end of the mass, Father Matysiak, tired in the evening, went to take a bath. He did not return for a long time, and finally a moan was heard. When the bathroom was opened he was found half conscious." Rev. Matysiak died at one o'clock on the 11th of October, 1904. The result of monoxide poisoning from a defective gas tank in the bathroom of the new rectory. Rev. Seweryn Niedbalski then became the second pastor of Holy Trinity.

TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4; 2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14; Luke 17:5-10 "For the vision still has its time... and will not disappoint."

Your wild and precious life

Today bears many names: Respect Life Sunday. Gandhi's birthday. International Day of Non-Violence. World Habitat Day. This cluster points to one precious idea: that all people bear the divine image and their welfare matters. We honor the whole fabric of life issues protecting each person from conception to death. Respect life with every decision.

Monday, Oct 03, 2022

Galatians 1:6-12; Luke 10:25-37 "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind." **Trust God's farsighted vision**

If you ever doubt what God has called you to do, then Mother Theodore Guerin is a saint for you. She opened what would become Saint Mary-of-the-Woods College, the first chartered school of higher education for women in the state. Guerin wrote, "It is astonishing that this remote solitude has been chosen for a novitiate and especially for an academy. All appearances are against it." It became the first women's college to offer journalism courses and degree work in secondary education, and was a pioneer in distance education, offering independent study in 1973. Trust God's vision and your role in plans longer-term than anyone can imagine.

Tuesday, Oct 04, 2022

MEMORIAL OF FRANCIS OF ASSISI, FOUNDER Galatians 1:13-24; Luke 10:38-42 "They glorified God because of me." Be praised, my Lord, for Brother Francis

Pope Francis chose his papal name to honor Francis of Assisi. Two of the pontiff's encyclicals pay further homage. Both Laudato Si' (Italian for "Praise be to you") and Fratelli Tutti (Italian for "All brothers and sisters") take their names from the words of Saint Francis. "Praise be to you" echoes the famous Canticle of Creation, apt for an encyclical on the care of creation. "All brothers and sisters" comes from the Admonitions of Saint Francis, the saint's entreaty to embrace a life of fraternal love. Read the opening of one of these texts today to honor "this saint of fraternal love, simplicity and joy."

Wednesday, Oct 05, 2022

MEMORIAL OF FRANCIS XAVIER SEELOS, REDEMPTORIST PRIEST Galatians 2:1-2, 7-14; Luke 11:1-4 "Praise the LORD, all you nations, glorify him, all you peoples! Go out to all the world, and tell the Good News." **"Go where I send thee"**

Today we celebrate the feast of Blessed Francis Xavier Seelos, a German Redemptorist missionary who gave his life serving sick immigrants in New Orleans during the late 19th century. Born in Bavaria in 1809, Seelos volunteered for foreign missions, arrived to the United States in 1843, and several decades later in 1866 found himself in New Orleans. Until his untimely death from yellow fever the following year, he pastored St. Mary's Assumption Church—where his national shrine remains to this day. As we face a double pandemic of ethnophobic division and COVID-19 in America, may we look to today's saint as a faithful model of ardent charity amidst strife and division.

Thursday, Oct 06, 2022

MEMORIAL OF MARIE ROSE DUROCHER, SISTER, FOUNDRESS Galatians 3:1-5; Luke 11:5-13 "Ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." Baby steps can take you far

The theme of small beginnings that led to great things echoes throughout Christianity, starting with Jesus and his 12 apostles. Most religious communities started out with a handful of underfunded but faith-filled individuals. Blessed Marie Rose Durocher fits the pattern. In spite of her poor health, Durocher teamed up with two friends to run a boarding school for 13 girls near Montreal. That was the humble beginning of today's international Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary. Have you ever taken a chance on a bootstrap endeavor? Could God be calling you to do so now?

Friday, Oct 07, 2022

MEMORIAL OF OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY Galatians 3:7-14; Luke 11:15-26 "... whoever does not gather with me scatters." The mother of all prayers

In his 2002 Apostolic Letter on the Most Holy Rosary, Pope John Paul II described the Rosary as a prayer that was from its inception "destined to bring forth a harvest of holiness." Though ostensibly a prayer calling on Mary's aide, it is ultimately centered on Christ and the eternal mystery of the Word made flesh. Regularly contemplating the mysteries of Christ's life—his Incarnation and early days (joyful); his revelatory love (luminous); his suffering and sacrifice (sorrowful); his saving grace (glorious) —is an exercise designed to bring peace, deepen our sense of faith, hope, and love, and, above all, help conform us "ever more closely to Christ until we attain true holiness."

Saturday, Oct 08, 2022

OPTIONAL MEMORIAL OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Galatians 3:22-29; Luke 11:27-28 "... blessed are those who hear the word of God and observe it.' " Listen up, as Mary did

Mary is the Queen of Heaven and preeminent among the saints. She holds the singular distinction of being at the same time both virgin and mother. Owing to her giving birth to the Son of God, she holds the exalted title Mother of God. Yet it is none of these things that make her blessed. Jesus ramps up Mary's blessedness a notch by recognizing that she's blessed because she hears the word of God and does it. That means we can join Mary in joy and fulfillment by doing the same.
