

The Gospels continue to challenge us to the core. This is especially true in the way our social relationships have developed. Feeling safe and secure in the world are not things that come easily these days. Actually, we may find ourselves feeling more reservation, caution, reluctance, and fear than ever before. In a moment's notice, life can drastically change. When someone has been intentionally and violently hurt, especially someone we love, we can all too easily find ourselves very attracted to the Old Testament philosophy of "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth."

Intellectually, we know this is not what Jesus wants us to do. But on some level it just seems to make practical or even political sense. After all, why should we allow someone to get away with a heinously violent act? Yet, Jesus cannot be any clearer than he is with this! Offer no resistance to one who is evil. Turn the other cheek as well. When pressed into service, go two miles. Do not turn your back on one who wants to borrow. Love your enemies. Be honest. Can you do as Jesus directs?

We want to be holy. But we are more comfortable with a definition of holiness that can keep us saying our prayers and on our knees in church. We are not comfortable with a definition of holiness that has something to say about to how we react to and negotiate life. We like to keep a sharp and strong line between the secular and the sacred. In fact, we would prefer that the doors between them be kept closed. God wants us to be holy as He is holy. If God sees this one way and we see it another, then where does this leave us on our journey to God?

Our minds like the practical, worldly, and secular answers to things. They are more black and white and at first glance appear to make more sense. Holiness wells up from our souls and is beyond reason. It cannot be explained. It is something we just simply know comes as a result of deep prayer. The truly contemplative eye knows inwardly that what Jesus asks is true and then willingly does it. It may not be easy.

Sacrament of Baptism: Sacramental preparation is required of the parents who desire to share the Catholic faith with their children and are held monthly throughout the City of Erie. Godparents must be Confirmed and practicing Catholics with a letter of recommendation from their pastor to serve as a sacramental sponsor.

Religious Education, First Holy Communion, and First Reconciliation programs are hosted at Saint Luke's Church for all eastside Erie parishes. Contact their parish office for more information and to register your child (814.825.7105).

Confirmation preparation for all eastside Erie parishes is hosted at Saint John's Church. Contact their parish office for more information and to register your child (814.454.2873).

Sacrament of Holy Orders: God calls all people to holiness. Some men are called to fulfill this vocation as priests. If you are interested in the priesthood, or have questions about it, please contact a parish priest or our Diocesan Vocation Director, Fr. Michael Polenik, at 1.800.374.3723.

Sacrament of Matrimony: Before a date can be scheduled, a priest must be contacted at least six months in advance to complete the required documents.

Sacrament of the Sick: Communal celebrations of Anointing the Sick are scheduled periodically. The sacrament can also be requested by any parishioner who is seriously ill or in danger of death. *Please note*: Federal law no longer permits hospitals or nursing homes to contact churches when a parishioner is admitted. It is important that family members notify the parish office if a loved one needs a visit, desires to receive Holy Communion, or needs to be Anointed.

Leave A Legacy: Consider Saint Stanislaus and Holy Trinity as you meet with your attorney or financial planner regarding your estate planning. Remember the needs of your parish family and leave a legacy of faith for future generations with your generous remembrance.

Bulletin Information Deadline: Please submit information to be included in the weekend bulletin by noon the Monday prior. Holiday bulletin announcements must be received by the parish office two weeks in advance.

THE SEASON OF LENT

The Season of Lent will soon be upon us. We will mark its beginning on Ash Wednesday with Masses celebrated at St. Stan's 8:00AM & 4:00PM. Holy Trinity will have a Mass at 5:30PM. St. Stan's will also host an Anointing of the Sick Mass on March 22nd at 9:30AM. More details will be published in future bulletins.

LENTEN REGULATIONS

The Season of Lent begins on February 26th and concludes at the start of the Holy Thursday Mass on April 9th. During that time, the Church encourages the faithful to consciously observe the traditional practices of **prayer**, **fasting**, and **almsgiving**. Additionally, daily Mass is particularly encouraged. **Ash Wednesday**, **all Fridays**, **and Good Friday** are days of abstaining from meat for those 14 years old and older. **Ash Wednesday and Good Friday** are also days of fasting (one full meal and two small meals to maintain adequate strength according to one's needs) for those 18 to 58 years old. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids are. When health or work is seriously affected, the law does not oblige.

SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

See clearly beyond racism

Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18; 1 Corinthians 3:16-23; Matthew 5:38-48 "For the wisdom of this world is foolishness in the eyes of God."

How do we fight the popular recommendation to circle the wagons around "our stuff" or, worse, "our kind"? In their 1979 pastoral on racism, our bishops noted: "Racism is not merely one sin among many; it is a radical evil that divides the human family and denies the new creation of a redeemed world. To struggle against it demands an equally radical transformation, in our own minds and hearts as well as in the structure of our society." Racism affects *everything:* immigration, education, economics, zoning laws, healthcare, and criminal justice. Pray to see the color of your values.

Monday, Feb 24, 2020

Let your doubt strengthen your faith

James 3:13-18; Mark 9:14-29 "I do believe! Help my unbelief."

Faith is a gift that invites us to believe in that which cannot be seen with our eyes, only our hearts. So it is not unusual to experience some doubts along life's way. A sudden death, a violent crime, or nothing you can pinpoint can trigger doubts. When doubts arise, do not be afraid. Do not run from the questions but trust that facing them can lead you to a deeper faith. When darkness clouds what you once took for granted, speak honestly to God even if you doubt God is listening, read God's word in scripture for each day, and beg the unseen God to increase your faith, as the Catechism puts it.

Tuesday, Feb 25, 2020

Time to resolve our differences

James 4:1-10; Mark 9:30-37
"Humble yourselves before the Lord and he will exalt you."

Traditionally today was a day to finish off all the rich and fattening foods in the household, including meats, which were given up for Lent. Thus the origins of the term Mardi Gras ("Fat Tuesday" in French), and the word *carnival* might be derived from the Latin for "removing or taking away meat." The excesses of some modern-day celebrations of the Carnival season, however, have obscured its connection with Lent. The tension between celebration and fast is nothing new. In 1559, the Dutch master Pieter Bruegel the Elder painted *The Fight Between Carnival and Lent*, contrasting scenes of raucous celebration on one side of the painting and solemn religious observance on the other. How do you resolve the tension of excess in your own life?

Wednesday, Feb 26, 2020

ASH WEDNESDAY; DAY OF FAST AND ABSTINENCE

When we do without, we grow within

Joel 2:12-18; 2 Corinthians 5:20-6:2; Matthew 6:1-6, 16-18 "Return to me with your whole heart, with fasting."

Is there any spiritual practice more tied to Lent than fasting? Forgoing creature comforts is the biblical way to express our sorrow for sin. It's a sacrifice that reminds us of what Jesus sacrificed. It also has the knack of clearing the clutter from our hearts so that our minds can focus on prayer. Make the most of your fasting this Lent by taking some advice from Saint Peter Chrysologus: "Fasting is the soul of prayer, mercy is the lifeblood of fasting. So if you pray, fast; if you fast, show mercy; if you

Set your intention

Deuteronomy 30:15-20; Luke 9:22-25 "I have set before you life and death... Choose life, then."

"Well begun is half done," quipped the eminently practical Benjamin Franklin. Today is a great day to get into the spirit of Lent, if Ash Wednesday didn't fully accomplish that for you for whatever reason. We have a rare opportunity to slow down and quiet our lives for the next few weeks. What is complicating life right now that you can simplify? How about giving up stress and fasting from complications this Lent as part of your spiritual practice? Turn Lent into a positive experience of drawing ever closer to Jesus, the source of life, light, and love in your life.

FRIDAY AFTER ASH WEDNESDAY; DAY OF ABSTINENCE

Think fast

Isaiah 58:1-9a; Matthew 9:14-15 "The days will come when the bridegroom is taken away from them, and then they will fast."

Catholics abstain from meat on all Fridays during Lent for many reasons. It is a sacrifice—a reminder of Christ's sacrifice on Good Friday. It is an act of humility as we eat modestly. It is an experience of solidarity with those who go without. It is penance for our past wrongdoings and an exercise in discipline to help us abstain from sin in the future. It is a form of preparation as we hunger, symbolically, for the eucharistic meal. Jesus fasted to draw closer to God and draw upon him for help. Now's your chance to do the same.

SATURDAY AFTER ASH WEDNESDAY

Take a leap of faith

Isaiah 58:9b-14; Luke 5:27-32

"If you call the sabbath a delight, and the LORD's holy day honorable . . . Then you shall delight in the LORD."

It's nice to know that the leap year has a historical connection to the Catholic Church. In 1582, Pope Gregory introduced the Gregorian calendar, still in use in much of the world today. The calendar corrected the former Julian calendar by providing a more accurate calculation of the year with the addition of an extra day every four years so that the calendar did not drift too far away from the actual movement of the earth around the sun. Let's give a special nod to Pope Gregory today for keeping us on track as we work to stay on course with our Lenten promises.
