

#### May 9, 2021 6th Sunday of Easter

"Remain in my love," and, "I call you friends," are powerful words that are found in John's Gospel. They are words that can easily become trite and quickly glossed over without fully pondering their profound beauty. They can radically change our lives and our relationships. They can open up new doors of adventure and hold countless possibilities for meaning. The essence of love and friendship are things that can easily be taken for granted. They have always been there and are a significant part of our lives. Many would say that they could not live without love and friendship, and they put a great deal of care into preserving, deepening and sustaining them. Love and friendship share a mutual relationship with each other that deserves more reflection.

Where does love come from? We can consider relationships that have not succeeded and conclude that they were somehow due to our "failures in love." In doing so, we assume that human beings are the ones responsible for love, its success and also its failure. While our weakness, emotional composition and sinfulness can easily impact our ability to love, its origin is not human. God is love. When we love, it is God who loves in and through us. It is because of this divine closeness that Jesus is able to call us friends! Realizing and contemplating this awesome reality becomes a game changer across the board. It gives us reason to clear the table of anything that can adversely affect the way we love so that we can open the door for its author to shine forth.

Coming upon this truth is what leads folks like St. Francis of Assisi to leave that which is comfortable and worldly and live a radical life. They relate with the love of God that radiates in and through all living things and appreciate their sacredness. Understanding this profound truth will also help us find peaceful solutions to world's problems, restore relationships with our sisters and brothers, bring the grace of loving stewardship to creation and heal many wounds. Once we begin to see how wonderfully holy all of life really is, we discover joy. It also enjoys the company of two other friends who are eager to become our friends as well: faith and hope. These are just as important to have and to share.

**Confirmation** preparation for all eastside Erie parishes is hosted at Saint Luke's Church. Contact their parish office for more information and to register your child (814.825.6920).

**Sacrament of Holy Orders**: God calls all people to holiness. Some men are called to fulfill this vocation as priests. If you are interested in the priesthood, or have questions about it, please contact a parish priest or our Diocesan Vocation Director, Fr. Michael Polenik, at 1.800.374.3723.

**Sacrament of Matrimony**: Before a date can be scheduled, a priest must be contacted at least six months in advance to complete the required documents.

**Sacrament of the Sick**: Communal celebrations of Anointing the Sick are scheduled periodically. The sacrament can also be requested by any parishioner who is seriously ill or in danger of death. *Please note*: Federal law no longer permits hospitals or nursing homes to contact churches when a parishioner is admitted. It is important that family members notify the parish office if a loved one needs a visit, desires to receive Holy Communion, or needs to be Anointed.

**Leave A Legacy**: Consider Saint Stanislaus and Holy Trinity as you meet with your attorney or financial planner regarding your estate planning. Remember the needs of your parish family and leave a legacy of faith for future generations with your generous remembrance.

Our readings today call us to love as Christ loves. In our Gospel, Jesus says, "Love one another as I have loved you." The ways Jesus has loved us and continues to love us are endless. We are called to imitate this love. And He tells us the greatest way to do this when He said, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." It is difficult to live that out in our humanity. Yet, it is made much easier when we faithfully love Christ. The fact of the matter is, as our love for Christ increases, so too does our capacity to love others. There are countless moments when we can do just that — for instance, waking up Saturday morning to attend daily Mass instead of sleeping in, or talking to God in the car on the way to work instead of listening to music. These are simple ways to express our love for the Lord by laying down our lives for Him. The more we find ways to love the Lord, the more we will find it easier to put aside our selfishness and serve others. Christ's command to love others may seem daunting. Yet, Christ would never ask something of us that we cannot live out. All we need to do is take baby steps. Ask yourself, "How can I better love Jesus right now?" for it is in loving Christ that we will better love others, and it is in loving others that we love Christ Himself.

I've seen one or two of those cheesy Hallmark movies that are especially popular around the holidays. Boy meets Girl. Boy and Girl encounter a catastrophic roadblock to their relationship — they're coaches of rival high school volleyball teams, or he runs a dog kennel and she works at a feline rescue, so it could never, ever work out, right? But sprinkle a little movie magic over the whole situation and Boy and Girl find what Hallmark tells us is true love. I could make a list of all the things that are inaccurate about these movies, and something I would put right near the top — maybe even above the sometimes-unbelievable storylines — is the idea that love is a feeling. See, I'm not sure if it's accurate to call these movies love stories. Attraction stories, sure. But if you've ever forgiven someone who's hurt you, nursed a dying parent, gotten up for an infant's night feeding or let your kid have the last piece of cake, you know that real love is a verb. It's something you do. And it is almost always a choice. Love one another. How often do we hear this? How often do we think about what it really means? # News for Our Partnership

## Dear Parishioners,

During this month, I am going to try and determine where our parishes stand relative to Covid vaccinations. My intention is three-fold. First, as the Bishop's Committee on further reopening of parishes begins their work, I would like to have reliable information to provide them, if needed. Second, it would be helpful in deciding which ministries we may be able to resume (e.g., Young at Heart, Eucharistic Ministry, etc.), and which new ministries we may be able to start (e.g., candle making club, adult faith formation, etc.). Third, for those still reluctant to come to church, having some statistical data may put them more at ease and assist them in deciding when to re-join our community.

Your willingness to assist me in this effort is **COMPLETELY VOLUNTARY**. If you have been fully vaccinated (i.e., two doses, if required, and a two week waiting period), simply sign the form in the back of the church. Also, you can call the Parish Office. As the month unfolds, I will begin compiling the data so that informed decisions can be made as we try to move forward with various parish ministries and activities.

Again, your participation is completely voluntary. The only information that I will disclose will be numerical (e.g., percentage of our members who have been vaccinated).

Thanks, in advance, to those who choose to cooperate so that we can bring greater normalcy back to parish life.

#### Sunday, May 09, 2021 SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER See through God's eye

Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48; 1 John 4:7-10; John 15:9-17 "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation whoever... acts uprightly is acceptable to him."

God does not see as we see, the prophet Isaiah reminds us. To harness the divine perspective, native peoples of western Mexico wove yarn on crossed sticks to represent the eye of God, which sees in four directions and in all elemental mediums: earth, wind, fire, and water. A God's eye became the portal through which God views the supplicant, or through which those who pray might share the divine vision. Practice seeing others as our compassionate God sees them.

> Monday, May 10, 2021 MEMORIAL OF DAMIEN DE VEUSTER, PRIEST Pray for those who heal Acts 16:11-15; John 15:26-16:4

"[Y]ou also testify, because you have been with me from the beginning."

The story of Saint Damien de Veuster, a Belgian priest who missioned to quarantined lepers in Hawaii and died of the disease, is extraordinary—although often echoed these days as legions of medical professionals all over the world put themselves in harm's way to treat the sick and dying of COVID. Father Damian is a "martyr of charity," and we've been blessed with multitudes of fearless, generous heroes like him who've expended themselves physically and emotionally to get us through this pandemic. Give thanks to God for our modern martyrs of charity and ask for Father Damian's intercession to keep them safe and send them spiritual strength.

> **Tuesday, May 11, 2021** EASTER WEEKDAY **Cultivate an appreciation of rural traditions** Acts 16:22-34; John 16:5-11 "His household rejoiced at having come to faith in God."

Though they've disappeared from most modern calendars, two older Catholic observances converge today. One is the petitioning of the "Ice Saints"—Boniface of Tarsus, Pancras, and Servatius—so named because their feasts fall during what were believed in some northern nations to be the last days of spring when a cold snap might damage spring plantings. The other observance, beginning on the Tuesday before Ascension Thursday, is known as the Minor Rogation Days. These two, along with the Catholic observance of Ember Days, are religious celebrations more commonly tied to the rhythms of rural life. They include the blessing of fields for a good harvest and prayers for good weather. Learn more at CatholicRuralLife.org.

#### Wednesday, May 12, 2021

MEMORIAL OF NEREUS & ACHILLEUS, MARTYRS; PANCRAS, MARTYR **Religious freedom is a timeless concern** Acts 17:15, 22—18:1; John 16:12-15 "[W]hen he comes, the Spirit of truth...will guide you to all truth."

Nereus and Achilleus were Roman soldiers who had participated in carrying out persecutions of Christians. In a "miracle of faith," they were converted and died their own martyred deaths in the late firs century. Pancras was a 14-year-old martyr of the same era who was beheaded because he publicly affirmed his faith in Jesus Christ. Give thanks for the ability to freely worship and pray for those around the world who do not enjoy such freedom.

## Thursday, May 13, 2021

SOLEMNITY OF THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD Rise to the occasion

Acts 1:1-11; Ephesians 4:1-13; Mark 16:15-20 "So then the Lord Jesus... was taken up into heaven and took his seat at the right hand of God."

Today's Feast of the Ascension gives wide recognition to a rather complex idea—that Christ both ascended to heaven and remains with us. In fact, we get a taste of heaven when we unify ourselves with Jesus in spirit and action. Saint Augustine taught "although he ascended alone, we also ascend, because we are in him by grace." From attending Mass to aiding the needy, on this feast day we can all take a step toward unity with Christ.

> Friday, May 14, 2021 FEAST OF MATTHIAS, APOSTLE Abstinence makes the faith grow stronger Acts 1:15-17, 20-26; John 15:9-17 "This I command you: love one another."

Although self-denial is celebrated in all major religions as a virtue, the value isn't so much in the practice as in the motivation. For Christians the virtuous motivation for abstinence of food, drink, or particular desires comes from love. We deny ourselves for God's sake and for the sake of others. Saint Matthias, patron of alcoholics, encouraged abstinence as a way to grow closer to God. He kept his focus on his vocation to spread the gospel and let little distract him from his purpose. What can you do today to keep your focus on love?

#### Saturday, May 15, 2021 EASTER WEEKDAY

Honor the forces of reconciliation Acts 18:23-28; John 16:23b-28

"For the Father himself loves you, because you have loved me and have come to believe that I came from God.

Pope Saint John XXIII taught that wars are never justified. Pope Saint John Paul II wrote to President George W. Bush that the Iraq War was unjust. Pope Benedict XVI questioned whether any war could be called just. Pope Francis, speaking in Hiroshima during his 2019 visit, repeated the positions of the previous popes. Christians face a dilemma, wanting world peace but also needing some protection from those who don't think the same way. The church recognizes a need for the military. But the task of the military should be to maintain peace and set the conditions for reconciliation. On this Armed Forces Day, pray for all our military service members. They have a difficult job.

Giver of Life, help us to see your life at work in our lives. Keep us from clinging to what is today, that we might receive the gifts of life that await us tomorrow. Amen.
