

February 2nd, 2019 Presentation of the Lord

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." Very often, having more light is not something we desire as it forces us to confront something we really do not want to see. There can be comfort found in darkness. It has an eerie sense of security to it. We do not have to challenge ourselves or be challenged and can simply exist in some fabricated state of self-fabricated blissfulness. Jesus came to bring light, and it is a light that is resisted by many and hated by some. It is a light that causes us to see things as they really are and not as we would want or need them to be.

It is no wonder then that Simeon boldly and honestly proclaims to Mary, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted and you yourself a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." We have to take the Gospel message as it is and not just use those parts that are useful to us or more palatable. Taking Jesus at face value can and will lead to turmoil and dissention. Hearts will be pierced. Whether we like it. Jesus' proclamation of what the world God created really ought to look like has real and absolute social implications.

It has a lot to say about how we treat our brothers and sisters: spiritually, personally, economically, and globally. It has everything to do with the poor, the immigrant, the scared, the unborn, the vulnerable, the sick, and the broken. The light opens us to a challenging, tableturning experience that may not be something we want to see but shows us where we need to be.

Sacrament of Baptism: Sacramental preparation is required of the parents who desire to share the Catholic faith with their children and are held monthly throughout the City of Erie. Call the parish office to register to schedule your preparation. Godparents must be Confirmed and practicing Catholics with a letter of recommendation from their pastor to serve as a sacramental sponsor.

Religious Education, First Holy Communion, and First Reconciliation programs are hosted at Saint Luke's Church for all eastside Erie parishes. Contact their parish office for more information and to register your child (814.825.7105).

Confirmation preparation for all eastside Erie parishes is hosted at Saint John's Church. Contact their parish office for more information and to register your child (814.454.2873).

Sacrament of Holy Orders: God calls all people to holiness. Some men are called to fulfill this vocation as priests. If you are interested in the priesthood, or have questions about it, please contact a parish priest or our Diocesan Vocation Director, Fr. Michael Polenik, at 1.800.374.3723.

Sacrament of Matrimony: Before a date can be scheduled, a priest must be contacted at least six months in advance to complete the required documents.

Sacrament of the Sick: Communal celebrations of Anointing the Sick are scheduled periodically. The sacrament can also be requested by any parishioner who is seriously ill or in danger of death. *Please note*: Federal law no longer permits hospitals or nursing homes to contact churches when a parishioner is admitted. It is important that family members notify the parish office if a loved one needs a visit, desires to receive Holy Communion, or needs to be Anointed.

Leave A Legacy: Consider Saint Stanislaus and Holy Trinity as you meet with your attorney or financial planner regarding your estate planning. Remember the needs of your parish family and leave a legacy of faith for future generations with your generous remembrance.

Bulletin Information Deadline: Please submit information to be included in the weekend bulletin by noon the Monday prior. Holiday bulletin announcements must be received by the parish office two weeks in advance.

2019 CATHOLIC SERVICE APPEAL SUMMARY

\$26,195 was pledged as of 1/24/20; \$24,745 was received, with a balance of \$1,480 not yet paid. We fulfilled our share to the Diocese –\$12,421, with \$12,324 for our parish projects: new interior doors for Social Center (\$7,124), replace the side walk outside of them (\$4,250), and painting doors and the fence around the priest residence. Our 2020 CSA begins in mid-February. We are counting on our parishioners for an even more successful response to this upcoming appeal.

Be a healing presence

2 Samuel 15:13-14, 30; 16:5-13; Mark 5:1-20 "They will lay hands on the sick, and they will recover."

During this time of year, lots of us worry about coughs and colds. Well, we Catholics have a saint for that: Saint Blaise, the patron of throat ailments. Many churches offer special blessings of the throat on this day. Blaise was a healer of bodily and spiritual ailments. When he retreated to a cave to pray, people continued to seek him to be made well. He even healed sick animals who came to him. Are you the kind of person others turn to for caring? How can you help make others whole?

Illness escapes easy answers

2 Samuel 18:9-10, 14b, 24-25a, 30—19:3; Mark 5:21-43 "He said to her, 'Talitha koum,' which means, 'Little girl... arise!'"

Today's gospel has dramatic stories of healing: Jairus' daughter is at death's door until Jesus works a miracle. And a woman with a hemorrhage finds respite through Christ. Despite the many times Jesus cured the sick, our faith doesn't simply teach "illness bad, Jesus good." It has a nuanced view of bad health. Illness is "among the gravest problems confronted in human life," states the Catechism; it can lead to "anguish and self-absorption." But illness can also be a path toward maturity, compassion, and gratitude, the Catechism continues. Take a moment today to meditate on how illness - your own and others - impacts your faith.

MEMORIAL OF AGATHA, VIRGIN, MARTYR

Noble is as noble does

2 Samuel 24:2, 9-17; Mark 6:1-6 "Many who heard him were astonished."

What is it about Saint Agatha, born in Sicily in 235, that she is one of only seven women named in the Canon of the Mass? Could it be her work as a deaconess? Was it the brutal torture she endured at the hand of Roman prefect Quintian? Was it her miraculous intervention to save a city from destruction by a volcano? The answer is likely in this exchange from *The Acts of the Martyrdom of Saint Agatha*: "What is your condition?" asks Quintian. Agatha responds, "Not only was I born free, but of noble family."

Quintian: "If you claim to be free and noble, why do you show yourself to live and dress like a slave?" "Because I am a servant of Christ," Agatha says. Remember the freedom that comes with a commitment to love.

MEMORIAL OF PAUL MIKI, PRIEST, MARTYR, AND COMPANIONS, MARTYRS

Learn forgiveness from a role model

1 Kings 2:1-4, 10-12; Mark 6:7-13

"He instructed them to take nothing for the journey but a walking stick."

We associate the city of Nagasaki, Japan with August 9, 1945 when the United States dropped the second (and last) atomic bomb used in World War II. But nearly 350 years earlier, in 1597, Paul Miki and 25 other Catholics, lay and clergy, children and adults, were martyred for their faith on a hill, now called Holy Mountain, overlooking Nagasaki. Miki used his last moments of life to forgive his executioners: "After Christ's example I forgive my persecutors," he is reported to have said. "I do not hate them. I ask God to have pity on all, and I hope my blood will fall on my fellow men as a fruitful rain." Seek a moment today, and every day, to practice forgiveness in your own life.

Street-level charity

Sirach 47:2-11; Mark 6:14-29

"[Herod] was perplexed, yet he liked to listen to [John the Baptist]."

While Jeanne Marie Rendu is hardly a household name, most people know of the squalid conditions in 19th-century France described in Victor Hugo's *Les Miserables* that compelled Jeanne Marie to act. Taking the religious name Rosalie when she entered the Daughters of Charity, she served the poor in disease-infested, overcrowded Paris and also guided leaders, thinkers, and social activists in her home, including Frederic Ozanam, with whom she later co-founded the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. She paid attention to the suffering around her and continually asked for God's intervention. "Never have I prayed so well as in the streets," she said. Her advice to her sisters more than 150 years ago still applies today as we encounter the poor among us: "Remember, Our Lord hides behind those rags."

MEMORIAL OF JOSEPHINE BAKHITA

Finding grace to overcome

1 Kings 3:4-13; Mark 6:30-34

"Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while."

A child of loving Sudanese parents who was kidnapped by Arab slave traders when she was 7, Josephine Bakhita (1869-1947) knew the trauma of loss of family, compounded by 12 years of slavery where she was bought and sold like a commodity. When a master took her to Italy and temporarily left her with the Canossian Daughters of Charity, Josephine found a home that—with the sisters' assistance—she never had to leave. She joined the community and for 42 years served as a cook and doorkeeper known for her gentle and charismatic presence. This amazing woman, whose body bore slavery's scars of 114 lashes, found it possible to proclaim, "The Lord has loved me so much: We must love everyone . . . we must be compassionate!" Practice compassion as best you can today.
