

Notes from the Pastor

One of the things from my first weekend at St. Thomas, St. Teresa, and Our Lady of Fatima is that there are a number of people who are ill at home and on hospice. I want to address this issue in a variety of ways right from the start.

- 1. First Friday of the Month: If there is someone from the parish who is homebound, please call the parish office and give us their name, address and phone number, so we can add them to the list of people we will visit each first Friday of the month. I hope to visit each of these people beginning in August to bring them Communion and the Anointing of the Sick.
- 2. Anointing of the Sick after Mass: I hope to schedule at least two opportunities for the Anointing of the Sick to take place after Mass on a certain weekend. The first of these will take place after each of the Masses on the weekend of September 9 & 10.
- 3. Education on the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. There is a great deal of misunderstanding about this sacrament and the old notion of what we called "Last Rites." Our understanding of this sacrament changed quite drastically 60 years ago, but many people have not updated their understanding of the sacrament.

The Anointing of the Sick is one of the sacraments that only a priest or bishop can administer because it involves the forgiveness of sins. Deacons are not able to give this sacrament because they do not have the ability to sacramentally forgive sins. The easiest way to describe this sacrament is to compare it to what people know about "Last Rites." Last Rites was only permitted to be received ONCE and so people waited until their last few breaths to call the priest to administer the sacrament. Sometimes the people waited too long, but the priest was able to still administer the sacrament even AFTER the person had died. The sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick can be received AS MANY TIMES AS NEEDED but CANNOT BE GIVEN TO SOMEONE WHO HAS DIED. There are NO sacraments that are given to the dead. Sacraments are for the living. The Anointing of the Sick is to be given to people who are seriously ill, weakened by old age, or preparing for serious surgery. The sacrament does involve forgiveness of sins and time to pray for strength in their struggle with illness and to pray for healing.

Our Lady of Fatima News

Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sin seems to be inevitable, both in us as individuals and in our society. Sadly, we are sinners, capable of wrong-doing; but also through God's love we can receive mercy and forgiveness. Our gospel today reminds us that weeds sown among the wheat will not destroy the final harvest. When we choose virtue over vice, we may question the importance of our individual contributions to the common good, but scripture tells us that great things can come from what seems small or insignificant. We may not see immediate results, but through faith and hope and the help of the Holy Spirit who makes up for what is lacking in our actions, we can accomplish marvelous things. The good that we do, even if it seems as small as a mustard seed or as insignificant as a bit of yeast, will grow and expand and help change the world.

Farewell Mass for Bishop-Elect Lohse

It was a joy-filled and blessed event recently at St. Peter Cathedral as the people of the Erie Diocese gathered to send forth Bishop-Elect Edward Lohse as he moves on to shepherd the Diocese of Kalamazoo, Michigan. Bishop Lohse was born, raised, ordained, and served the majority of his priesthood in the Erie area, and we are proud of him. He remarked during the farewell Mass that he saw fellow priests and people in the congregation from all eras of his life. Our partnered parishes had many in attendance. We pray that Bishop-Elect Lohse will be warmly welcomed in Kalamazoo, and that the Holy Spirit will guide him in his ministry in the Michigan diocese.

Notable Dates

Tuesday, July 25, is the Feast of St. James, the Apostle. When James asked to sit at Jesus's right hand in His kingdom, Christ asked him if he could "drink of the cup I drink," an encounter that prefigured James's death as the first of the Apostles to be martyred. Wednesday, July 26, is the memorial of Saints Joachim and Anne. The Blessed Virgin's parents, Saint Joachim and Saint Anne played a key role in God's plan of salvation. Their daughter Mary gave birth to the Savior. On Saturday, July 29 we remember Sts. Martha, Mary, and Lazarus; siblings who were friends and followers of Jesus and welcomed Him in their home.



A brief review of the sacrament and those who are eligible to receive it may be needed. This sacrament is meant to help a person cope with their illness and confront the limitations that being human imposes on our souls: our hopes, our dreams, our desire to be meaningful. That sickness does not just affect our bodies but also our spirits and our attitudes. It is intended to heal the anguish of the soul.

"Anointing of the Sick,' is not a sacrament for those only who are at the point of death. Hence, as soon as any one of the

faithful begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, the fitting time for that person to receive this sacrament has certainly already arrived." (Constitution on the Liturgy, Vatican Council II)

What might constitute "in danger of death from sickness or old age (serious illness)? Or who is eligible to receive the sacrament?

- A person who becomes ill and the illness becomes more serious;
- A person may be anointed before surgery whenever a serious illness is the reason for the surgery;
- Elderly people may be anointed if they have become notably weakened even though no serious illness is present;
- Sick children are to be anointed if they have sufficient use of reason to be strengthened by this sacrament. In a case of doubt whether a child has reached the use of reason, the sacrament is to be conferred;
- Some types of mental illness are now classified as serious. Those who are judged to have a serious mental illness and who would be strengthened by the sacrament may be anointed (depression, paranoia, etc...);
- In case of doubt as to whether the illness is serious or not, the person should be anointed.

The Anointing of the Sick was started 60 years ago as a way to better minister to those who were seriously ill and dying. Some of you may remember what the church called last rites. Last Rites was a sacrament that could be received only once in a lifetime and thus people waited until their last breathe to receive it. Sometimes the priest arrived in time and sometimes he didn't. Priests even anointed dead bodies. The Catholic Church no longer has what is called "last rites." It has been replaced with the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. It is surprising that people 60 years later are still using the term "last rites" and even talking about the sacrament in terms that we stopped using 60 years ago.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is a healthy revision of what was called Last Rites. The Anointing of the Sick can be received as many times as a person needs it, where last rites were given only once. The Anointing of the Sick still carries with it forgiveness of sins, a prayer for physical healing, and a prayer for strength in the midst of one's suffering. The Anointing of the Sick is intended to strengthen people in faith and hope in the midst of their struggle with illness and even death. We try to minister to people in their illness and suffering rather than just waiting until they are at the moment of their last breath. Today, a priest is not allowed to anoint someone who has died – sacraments are for the living, not the dead. Anyone who has a serious or chronic illness, is preparing for major surgery, or who is struggling with a serious mental illness can be anointed. Even children who have sufficient use of reason to understand the effects of the sacrament can be anointed in case of serious or chronic illness. If you are not sure if the illness is serious or not, the person should be anointed. The sacrament can be received as many times as needed.
