Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments- Digital Behavior: Parents create trust with children by initiating open, honest discussions. These dialogues are an opportunity to communicate values and expectations about your family's appropriate digital behavior, including viewing or sharing content, and apps they can and cannot use. Check in frequently with your children about their digital experiences to address any potential risk of cyberbullying and harm. Be clear that your intention is to look out for their wellbeing, and that you want to have an open dialogue. Listen to their concerns and express your perspective. To minimize the risk of cyberbullying or harm from digital behavior, parents can: set clear expectations about digital behavior and online reputation, educate about the harmful effects of cyberbullying, posting hateful speech or comments, sexting, and sharing naked photos of themselves or others (including potential legal issues), be clear about what content can be viewed or shared, and identify which apps are appropriate for your child's use and which are not. Establish rules about the amount of time that a child can spend online or on their devices. Model positive, respectful digital behavior on your own devices and accounts. The Special Intentions of Pope Francis

Father of all mercies, during this month of November, we pray for every person who suffers from depression. May all who suffer from depression or burn-out find support and a light that opens them up to life.

Unexpected

Life didn't turn out the way I expected. In some ways it has exceeded my expectations, and in other ways it has disappointed them. Never in my wildest dreams as a child would I have imagined the life I have lived. The adventures, experiences, and opportunities, the love I have given and received, and the success I have enjoyed have all far exceeded my expectations. But I also never imagined in my worst nightmares the dark side of these bright lights.

We all end up living unexpected lives.

There are hopes and dreams that didn't materialize that I grieve, but I have been surprised and delighted by other unexpected gifts. And there are hopes and dreams that I am glad did not come to fruition. The unexpected goes both ways.

But these are not the things that make life most unexpected. It's the truly unexpected things, those we don't hope for or fear – particularly those that come out of nowhere and break our hearts. You wake up one morning and discover that your life has been changed forever, because of something you did or something someone else did. It's the things we don't plan, the things we never imagined would happen. It's those unexpected events that slap you so hard in the face that you can taste blood in your mouth.

Nobody's life turns out the way they expect it to. We shouldn't be surprised. Nobody looks back on life to discover it unfolded exactly as they hoped or planned, but I found myself particularly unprepared for the inevitability of the unexpected. That's the paradox: It is inevitable that we live unexpected lives.

Life doesn't unfold according to our plans. But sooner or later, we each have to decide how we are going to make the most of our one, brief, unexpected life. It is then that we come face-to-face with two enduring truths. We cannot live without hope that things will change for the better, and we are not victims of our circumstances.

Hope is not always as accessible as we would like. It often seems just out of reach at those times when we are most in need of it, when our hearts are broken, our minds downtrodden, and our souls crushed. Yet, even in those moments, we have a choice. The unexpected is either a curse or an opportunity. We get to decide.

She, from her poverty, has contributed all she had. (Mark 12:44)

What was it about this widow that drew Jesus' attention and delighted Him so much? Many others have given far more to the Temple treasury than she had. No it wasn't the size of her gift that touched Him so deeply. It was her willingness to give all.

You can see a similar mindset in the widow in today's first reading. She used the last of her provisions to feed the prophet Elijah. Notice how God blessed her generosity and provided for her – and Elijah – through the famine.

The willingness of these two widows to offer their eager gifts was pleasing to the Lord. That's because sacrificial giving reflects the character of God Himself. Just think of the way Jesus held nothing back when He have Himself to us. He gave every drop of blood, every ounce of mercy and love.

Does this mean that God expects us to empty our bank accounts or our pantries? Not necessarily. But He does want us to pour out our hearts. Whether we are giving financially or sacrificing our time or attention. He wants to see us become as generous as He is.

There are times when, like the widows in today's reading, you might feel as if you don't have much left. Beyond the financial, you might be "scraping the bottom of the barrel" of your patience or your sympathy or your forbearance.

But know that when you ask God for the grace and strength to give that little you have, He will bless you. He might give you what you lack, or He might give you the strength to spend yourself a little more. Even when it seems like a drop in the bucket, your decision to give pleases the Lord. That's because each time you choose to give of yourself, you become more like Him. He is building His own character in you!

"Lord, help me give of myself as generously as you did."
