

Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time God's love is free, and God's mercy extends to all. Sometimes that is a hard concept to accept for those who always try to abide by God's laws. Think about

the reaction that the brother of the "Prodigal son" had upon the son's return. How about Martha getting upset with Mary because she felt burdened with all the work when Mary spent her time at the feet of Christ? There was dissention in the early Church about Christians conforming to the dietary restrictions of the Chosen People and the circumcising of men. Human beings judge people by our own standards. Lucky for all of us that God doesn't have such standards. Jesus recognized the faith and the need of the Canaanite woman in the gospel today and compassionately healed her daughter. Christ's universal message of salvation includes everyone. Our Redeemer's mercy and love reaches out across religious, social, political, and geographic borders to the ends of the earth. We must acknowledge and respect the traditions, beliefs, and background of all people. They are our brothers and sisters as children of God, and will be welcome into His heavenly kingdom.

Thursday, August 20, is the Notable Dates memorial of St. Bernard, Abbot and Doctor of the Church. St. Bernard was a nobleman who joined an abbey in France. Many of his family members and friends followed in his footsteps. Bernard wanted to follow and lead others to Christ, not to himself. He used his gifts for leadership, arbitration, writing, and creating harmony in the abbey to give glory to God. On Friday, August 21, we remember St. Pius X, Pope. As pope at the turn of the last century, St. Pius X reformed the liturgy and breviary, promoted Gregorian chant, opposed Modernism, and lowered the age of first Communion from twelve to seven. St. Pius had humble origins and never lost his love for simple, accessible liturgy and expressions of doctrine.

Saturday, August 22, the Memorial of the Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary is observed. Eight days after we celebrate her Assumption, we honor Mary as the Queen of Heaven. Mary's life mirrors that of her Son, whose temple she was as the Christ bearer.

Keep in mind; every saint started out as a sinner, and every sinner has the chance to be a saint.

My house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples. (Isaiah 56: 1, 6-7)

All of today's readings tell us that God's salvation is meant for everyone. The prophet Isaiah speaks of foreigners who will join themselves to the Lord (56:6). The psalmist declares, "May the peoples praise you O God" (Psalm 67:6). Jesus praises a Canaanite woman's faith (Matthew 15:28). And Paul, apostle to the Gentiles, proclaims that God wants to "have mercy upon all" (Romans 11:32).

For the Jewish people in today's first reading, this must have been difficult to accept. They had just returned from exile to discover foreigners living in their holy city, Jerusalem. Their covenant told them that they were set apart as a holy people chosen by God. So how could "impure" Gentiles be living on their land? They forgot that God had chosen them by His grace, not just for their own sake, but to bring His light to every nation.

This call became increasingly clear in the early Church. Initially, all of Jesus' followers were Jewish. But as Gentiles came to believe in the Lord, the Jewish Christians began to understand that God's plan of salvation was far bigger than they had expected. Learning to live and work and pray alongside Gentiles could not have been easy. But they, like us, had to allow God's grace to help them love each other. The result? The diverse, beautiful, sometimes messy Church we know today.

Jesus wants His Church to be a house of prayer for all nations so that every person can belong to His family. He sees people who are searching for hope, meaning, and a place to meet God, and He is asking us to draw them in, to be the loving, welcoming face of the Church. May we always be open to everyone who is seeking the Lord, and through us, may God's grace flow out to the entire world!

"Jesus, help me to show everyone the love that You have given me."
