MARRIAGE



Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

We see in our scriptures today how God feeds us and answers all our needs. Our Lord's abundant care for His people is apparent when Elisha fed the hundred with scant resources, and when Jesus gave thanks for the five loaves and two fishes, fed five thousand, and still have food left. What does this tell us? God's love and concern for us is beyond calculation—it is limitless. Both of these accounts pre-figure our Mass. What occurred with the multiplication of the loaves and fishes also occurs at every liturgy. Thanks is given for the gifts: bread and wine; and God enters into these elements to provide nourishment for everyone, whether there are five people in the congregation or five thousand. Jesus fills our body and soul. In John's gospel today we are shown that the miracle of nourishing God's people continues today every time the Eucharist is celebrated.

The Special Intentions of Pope Francis

Heavenly Father, We pray that, in situations of conflict, we may be courageous architects of dialogue and friendship. May the Church receive from the Holy Spirit the grace and strength to reform herself in the light of the Gospel.

Gather the fragments left over, so that nothing will be wasted (John 6:12)

In John's telling of the miracle of the loaves and fishes, Jesus says very little. Out of a story that is 310 words long, Jesus speaks only 25! But there is a whole world of meaning behind each word.

First, Jesus sets the miracle in motion with a practical question: "Where can we buy enough food for them to eat?" (John 6:5). Jesus knows what He is going to do, but He wants to prompt Philip and the other disciples to expand their expectations. He is pointing out a situation that is humanly impossible to solve so that they will begin to consider other, more divinely inspired options.

Next, He prepares everyone to receive the miracle He is about to perform: "Have the people recline" (John 6:10). They don't have to do much – just take a position of rest and trust. Of course, that may not be easy when you're hungry and you can't see any food readily available. But that's the way it is with the Lord: sometimes He asks you to rest and trust in His provisions, even when you can't see any possible hope of a way out.

Finally, He brings the miracle to a close: "Gather the fragments left over, so that nothing will be wasted" (John 6:12). Jesus is generous – exceedingly generous – but He is not wasteful. A lot was left over, and Jesus wanted to make sure it went to good use. These baskets of food – one for each apostle – were His way of telling us to be equally generous in sharing His blessings. Every gift He gives is meant not just for us; it's meant to shape how we speak and act to that we can become stronger witnesses to His love.

Like manna from heaven, Jesus' grace is always showering down on us. May we learn how to receive it and always be ready to offer it to the people around us!
